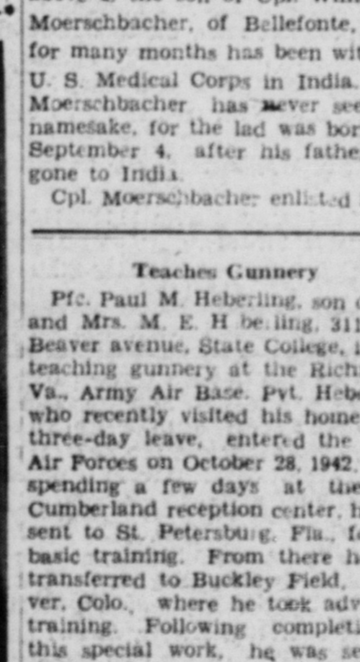
Training in Kansas

Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Hardy of Flemington, visited with Mr. and Mrs. Richard Gonsallus and family on Sunday.

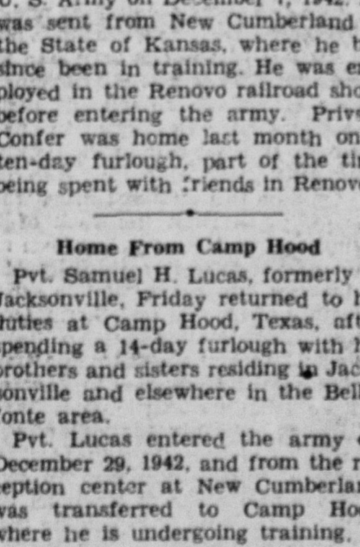
At Camp Shelby

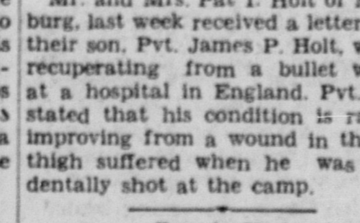
Home From Camp Hood

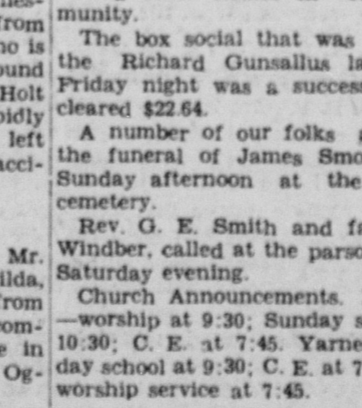
Accidentally Wounded

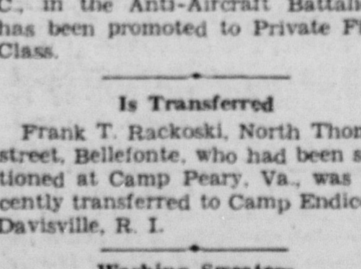
Runs to Utah

Pfc. Charles Fogleman, who has been stationed at Fort Ord, California, since sometime in January, has recently been promoted to T/5 Corporal.

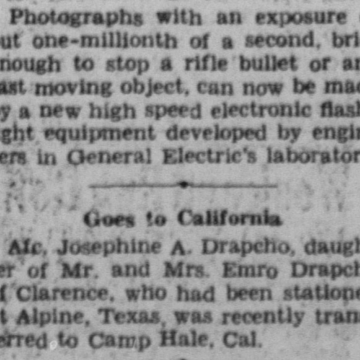
Receives Promotion

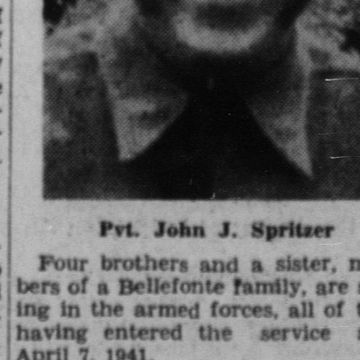
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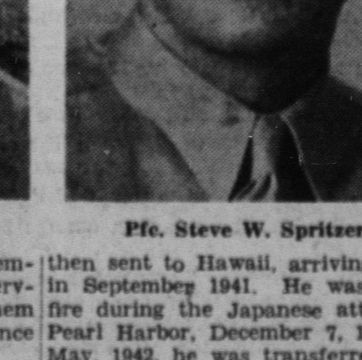
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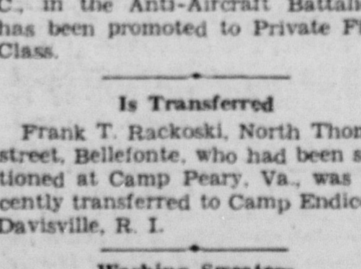
