SLAUGHTER OF BACK-YARD LIVESTOCK FOR HOME USE

The State War Board of the U. S. Department of Agriculture has recently ruled that a person (other than a farmer), who has kept and fed livestock on his property for a period of at least 6 weeks may be granted permission to slaughter such animals for home consumption only, according to Miles H. Cubbon, chairman of the Centre County War Meat Committee. A person who buys finished livestock cannot slaughter for home consumption.

Permission to slaughter can be granted only on the basis that the person who has raised livestock in whole or substantial part in his backyard, has proper sanitary facilities for slaughtering and suitable storage, or who will have the slaughtering and preservation done by a reputable custom slaughterer.

Applications for permits to slaughter must be addressed to the Centre County U. S. D. A. War Board, Bellefonte Trust Company Building, Bellefonte, and must state the number of animals to be killed and the exact months in which slaughtering will be done.
