



ment. They are among the leaders in their field. The White Rock Quarries are furnishing materials for use in the great steel mills of Pittsburgh. The American Lime & Stone Co., founded in 1901, manufactures high quality lime and limestone for use all over the United States in many industries. The Universal Match Co. was started in 1900, and the local plant manager, Calvin Troupe, has been with the company for 42 years. Other plants are the Bellefonte Gas Co. and the National Gypsum Co. All of these plants are doing their utmost to aid Uncle Sam in the prosecution of this war against aggressors.

"In addition to working in war plants turning out materials for war, the people of Bellefonte are aiding in other ways. They have responded liberally to the Bond drives. The various clubs such as the Elks, the Kiwanis, YMCA, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and other service organizations are doing everything they can for the welfare of service men and women. The USO, located in the Chamber of Commerce building, offers entertainment and information for service men and even provides over-night lodging for them when needed. The two ex-service men's organizations are the Brooks-Doll Post No. 33 of the American Legion, commanded by Leonard R. Glenn, and the Jackson-Crissman-Saylor Post of the VFW, with John A. Bryan as commander.

"The civic affairs of Bellefonte are handled by such worthy indiv-iduals as Mr. Hardman P. Harris, mayor; W. W. Sieg, president of the Council; Thomas Mensch, president of the Chamber of Commerce; and, of course, the many others who assist them.

"The doings of the men on the battle fronts and the happenings on the home front are faithfully reported in three newspapers: The Centre Daily Times, published at State College and edited by Jack Yeager; The Centre Democrat, A. C. Derr and Paul M. Dubbs, editors, and The Keystone Gazette, edited by Thomas Mensch.

"And there is one other thing that we must mention while talking of the honor community of Bellefonte. It's trout. Yes, Bellefonte trout are a hource of amazement and pleasure to the thousands of tourists who visit the spacious natural aquarium, located near the heart of the town. Fisherman's Paradise, sponsored by the State, is located just out-side the community limits. Here thousands of the disciples of Izaak Walton gather each season from Pennsylvania and nearby states to lure the speckled beauties from artificial dams in which they are kept.
