Paint Protects Insulating Boards Painting commercial insulating board used in poultry houses protects the material from injury due to picking by the birds. While experiments at the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment station indicate that gray paint is most effective, Professors Gross and Besley recommend paint that makes a hard, glossy surface, regardless of color. They advise two or three coats to insure the desired film thickness. Paint technologists suggest that the first coat should be a primer-sealer to seal the surface so that following coats of paint or enamel do not sink in. Loose fibers seem to encourage picking, so only the harder boards should be used.

Some Surprising Scenes To those who think of the Sahara desert as a broad waste of unbroken sands, the great land expanse which covers most of inland North Africa back from its settled coastlands and the Nile, would offer some surprising scenes. In addition to the typical regions of shifting sand dunes and scattered oases, much of the country which the Allied forces are crossing-or have crossed-is high and rocky plateau. Occasionally it rises to mountain heights of 10,000 feet and more, or it may sink to huge depressions many feet below sea level. There are even peaks temporarily tipped with snow in winter, and upland areas where streams run continuously in their higher courses.
