Johnston Separated by thousands of miles, under varied conditions of military service, the above brothers, sons of Mrs. Martha Johnston, of Pennsylvania Furnace, are working valiantly for Allied Victory. Two of them are overseas, and the third training to go. Staff Sergeant Technician William B. Johnston entered the service May 3, 1941. From New Cumberland he was sent to the Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md., and later to Fort Sheridan, Ill. From there he went to Fort Leonard Wood, Mo., and finally to Pittsburg, Calif., from whence he sailed about Feb. 25, 1943, for New Caledonia.

Studies Air Mechanics Fred L. Carson, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry P. Carson of Port Matilda, is studying aircraft mechanics in the Army Air Forces Technical Training Command at the Academy of Aeronautics, La Guardia Field, N. Y.
