#### AIR RAID SIGNALS NOW STANDARDIZED

Frequent changes in the air raid signals throughout the state have tended to confuse the citizens recently, nowever, now that the signals have become standardized, Fred Luse, local chief warden agreed when interviewed, that the current set-up might well be publicized.

The first siren blown in the air raid alert is the two-minute steady signal. At this time all lights should be put out but cars and pedestrians may continue on their way.

The second signal, a two-minute fluctuating one, indicates enemy planes in the immediate vicinity. At this time traffic must stop and persons on the street and in cars must find shelter indoors,

A two-minute steady signal follows this one indicating that planes have passed on and slow traffic may be resumed. Lights, however, do not come on until the all-clear is sounded, a fifteen-second steady signal. If the fluctuating signal should be

emy planes have returned and the absolute blackout must be in effect. The fluctuating signal is also being used in Centre Hall as a fire warning and for the twelve o'clock

noon siren test on Saturday. According to Mr. Luse, a good way to distinguish a fire warning from a blackout at night is to watch the street lights. They are put out promptly for the blackout. Ordinarnot be confused with the first steady signal of an air raid alert. It is possible, however, in an actual air raid, that enemy planes might be discovered in an area too late to give this usual two-minute steady signal. In that case the fluctuating warning would be blown first.
