Edward C. Funk of Curtin died at his home at 7:45 p. m. Wednesday, August 4, 1943. Mr. Funk had been ill for some time. He was aged 70 years and 29 days. Born at Curtin, July 5, 1873, he was a son of Joseph and Sarah Evans Funk. His wife, the former Nancy M. Barger, survives. He was the last of his family. He was a member of the Curtin Methodist church. Funeral services were held at the church Saturday afternoon with Rev. Roy A. Goss officiating. Interment was made in the Curtin cemetery.

Committal services were held last Thursday at Baptist cemetery, Blanchard, for Mrs. Elsie Bechdel Myers, 68, a native of Blanchard who died Tuesday, August 3, 1943, at the Protestant Home in Pittsburgh. Local Youth Sees Invasion of Sicily

(Continued from page one) many a depth charge was dropped by the escorting vessels. Not a single ship of the convoy was damaged, he said.

Before and during the invasion the destroyer was engaged in general convoy duty, escorting ships to Pantelleria, Malta, Bizerte and other allied ports in that area. When the call to battle stations is sounded, Seaman Stover's post of duty is with the crew of one of the howitzer guns. "Whenever any job aboard the ship is to be done, we all pitch in and help," the seaman explained. "Once when we took aboard a fresh supply of ammunition at a North African port, the whole crew helped. The captain later remarked he'd never seen ammunition taken aboard so fast."

First intimation those aboard the destroyer had to the pending invasion of Sicily came when, an hour or so out of Bizerte, the captain called all hands to the "fantail," at the rear of the ship, and explained what was to be done.

Seaman Stover said the greatest of credit goes to the soldiers. "They are the ones who are carrying the ball, and they're getting most of the knocks," he said. Stover, home on a five-day leave, is a twin brother of Luther Stover, who is in the Army Air Corps at Gardner Field, California. The twins, who usually agreed on most major matters, couldn't see eye-to-eye when it came to picking what branch of service they were to enter. Clair explained that he couldn't see the Army and Luther couldn't see the Navy.

Prior to enlisting in the Navy on August 14, 1942, Clair was employed as a draftsman in Trenton, N. J. for a subsidiary of the General Motors Corporation. He received his boot training at Newport, R. I., then went to a special school for four months before being assigned to destroyer duty.

"The food is fine. They have signs 'take all you want, but eat all you take,' and there's no complaint on the quality or quantity of food. Most of the officers, especially the regular Navy men, treat you well," Clair said.

"But don't get me wrong," he cautioned. "I say I like the Navy and that everything is fine, and I mean just that, but I don't mean I'll shed any tears when it's all over and we can come home to stay."

Military services in charge of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of State College, were held at the grave in the Christian cemetery, Blanchard.

Kunes, of Blanchard, and his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Price Johnsonbaugh, of State College.

Pvt. Johnsonbaugh, who gave up his studies in high school to enlist in the Marines, received his basic training at Parris Island and from there was sent to Florida. Upon completion of special work in Florida he was transferred to New River, N. C., and expected soon to be sent to California.

Pvt. Kenneth Walker, son of Mrs. Floyd Walker, of Pike street, Bellefonte, was home on furlough from New River, N. C., when he learned of the death of his close friend, Pvt. Johnsonbaugh. Pvt. Walker said Pvt. Johnsonbaugh was in an amphibian tractor unit and that he was scheduled to have departed for California on Friday—the day after the fatal accident.
