Walter Eberhart, chairman of the special committee in charge of the lime dust nuisance, reported that the Warner Company is making some progress in trying to correct the nuisance. He said the company expects to install a dust filter the end of this month and another will be received in about eight weeks. Officials of the company will visit plants near Pittsburgh to study eliminators.

Council complimented Mr. Eberhart on the work done in trying to have lime dust removed and expressed the opinion that the lime company is making efforts to comply with the borough's requests.

George Brown, tax collector, was exonerated of uncollected taxes and the way was cleared for him to obtain a new bond.

A representative of a rat-exterminating company appeared at the meeting with a proposition to eliminate rats from the former borough dump, north of town. The cost was given as \$240. Council did not act on the matter.

The resignation of Mrs. Pauline Witmer Jenkins as secretary of the borough water office was accepted and will become effective September 1. Five applications for the position were received and will be considered by the water committee.

A letter from the Department of Highways stated that the State could do nothing about the situation which causes surface water from West Linn street to drain down on North Water street.

John Galanda, borough police officer, gave the following report covering the period from August 2 to August 16:

Cars tagged, 13; larceny investigations, 2; auto accident investigations, 2; arrested for drunk and disorderly conduct, 4; bicycles recovered, 3; transients in the borough lockup, 3; confidential reports, 9; collected from parking meters, \$175.39; collected from curb market, \$14.

The two borough policemen were each granted a week's vacation. Fire police will take their places during their absences.

Pounds collected, 19,956 pounds were mixed iron, 712 pounds were paper and 632 pounds were rubber. No wire or wire fence was collected.

The kinds of scrap varied from an antique corn planter to a gasoline engine. A considerable number of plowshares were collected—possibly five or six hundred. At one farm 101 plowshares were collected—while another farm produced 55 shares. Five old car bodies also were collected.

In connection with the drive, much credit must be given to the boys, for without their efforts, most of the scrap would not have been collected. The committee in charge of the drive were: Mahlon Bowen, president; Glenn Rhine, treasurer; Paul Bressler, secretary; and Robert Corman, adviser of Walker Township F. F. A. Other F. F. A. members participating in the drive were: George Zimmerman, Earl Dunkle, Thomas Hinds, Nevin Detrich, Arthur Nilson, Warren Witmer, Carl Sitzer, William Ingram, Donald Detrich, Bruce Long, Fern Dunkle, Harold Zimmerman, Donald Zimmerman, Leslie Detrich. In addition William Gates, Richard Gates, David Detrich and Kenneth Bressler also participated.

The F. F. A. takes this means to thank the people of Walker township for their assistance in gathering and giving scrap. Much credit is also due Supervising Principal Harry Bailey, and the Walker Township Board of Education for their cooperation in making the drive possible.

As yet no plans have been made for a second scrap drive. However, if the need for scrap again becomes acute, another drive may be organized by the F. F. A.
