en to get all the information they desire regarding Navy enlistment without the necessity of travel to distant points, an important factor these days in view of gas and tire restrictions.

The Recruiting Caravan is in charge of Chief Petty Officer Frank J. Andrews and the rest of the crew includes Quartermaster George A. Heaton, Chief Petty Officer G. William Ambrose who serves as advance or contact man, and two members of the WAVES, specialists Travis and Stransberg, who are being transferred to the caravan by the Navy Department for this special duty.

The "Land Cruiser" will be "moored" at the Diamond, Bellefonte, and daily operating hours will be from 9:30 a. m. until 8 p. m.

The traveling recruiting outfit of cab and trailer weighs nearly seven tons, has an overall length of 57 feet, is 11 feet high and 9 feet wide. In it are sleeping accommodations for four. It has table desks, hot plate, sink, refrigerator, radio, public address system, typewriter, clothes cabinets, fans, phone system and sidewalk tables and chairs to be used by recruiters in interviewing applicants.

The Caravan "Cruise" is especially aimed at reaching young men of 17 years, and skilled tradesmen up to 50 years of age who are interested in the Sea-Bees or Construction Battalion. Special quarters are being set aside for the use of the WAVES on the Caravan where ladies

between the ages of 29 and 36 may secure information and application blanks for enlistment in the WAVES.
