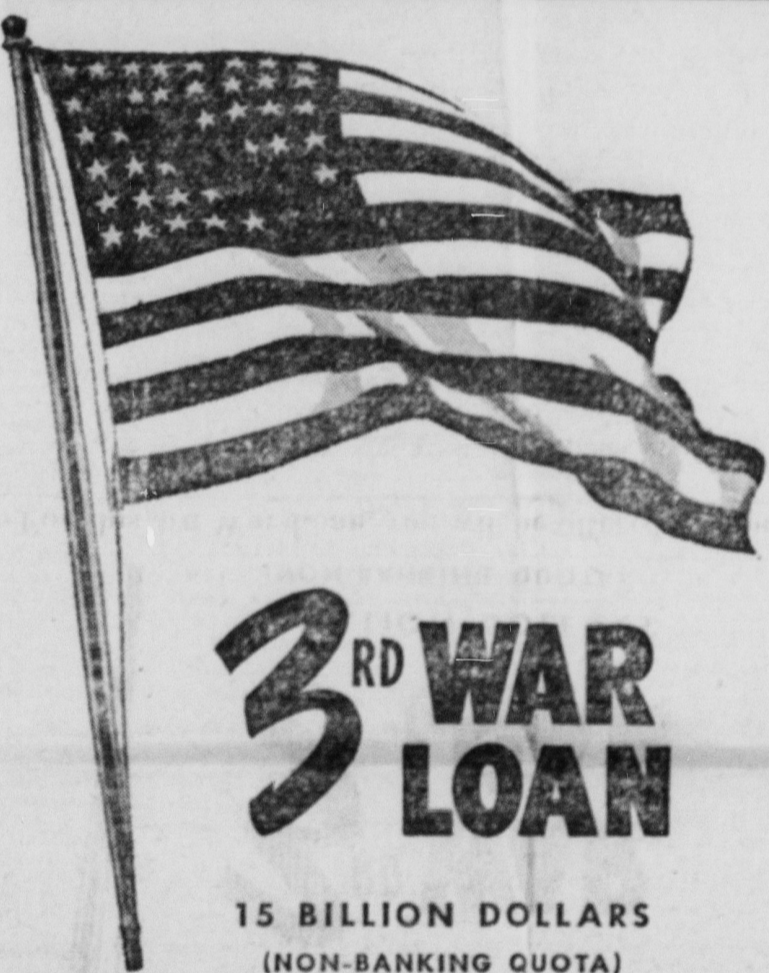
MONUMENT
