SENTENCED FOR HIGHWAY DEATH

Woman Draws Suspended Sentence; Husband Gets 6 Months, \$200 Fine

Pleading guilty to charges growing out of the death of Edward McKinn, of Clearfield, R. D., Mr. and Mrs. Robert Daniels were sentenced in the Clearfield county court last week by Judge Wallace Smith. Mrs. Daniels pleaded guilty to the charge of failure to render assistance and failure to disclose identity at the scene of the accident and operating a vehicle without an operator's license. She was given a suspended sentence with cost of prosecution to be paid 90 days after the release of her husband, Robert Daniels, from the county jail. She was also put on probation for one year. Her husband pleaded guilty to the charge of operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated and was sentenced to the county jail for six months and fined \$200 plus the costs of prosecution, with the proviso that if he pays the costs and \$100 on the fine, balance of the fine would be remitted.

Mrs. Daniels allegedly was operating her husband's car on the night of Tuesday, April 20, when she struck and killed Edward McKinn, 27, Clearfield, R. D., resident as he walked along the highway just east of the borough line. Her husband was asleep on the seat beside her at the time of the accident. Her brother, John Gieswhite, was also an occupant of the car, apparently asleep on the rear seat.

Pvt. Albert E. Scheib, of the Clearfield state police conducted the investigation and made the arrest on Wednesday, April 21, at which time McKinn's body was found in the front yard of the Dominic McCall home on Daisy street extension. He had been thrown more than 100 feet from where he had been hit.

Mrs. Daniels said in a statement given at the District Attorney's office at the time of her arrest that she had been in Clearfield early on the evening of April 20th and had gone home with friends. She started to walk to Clearfield when her husband and brother failed to return by 10:30 p. m. She was picked up by a trucker and given a ride as far as the Pennsylvania station on Third street. She found her husband and brother in a drinking establishment in East End, and succeeded in getting them into the car, with her husband at the wheel. However, Mrs. Daniels declared it was obvious that he was in no condition to drive and suggested that he allow her to drive them home. He consented and fell asleep almost as soon as he changed places with her. Mrs. Daniels in her statement said that she had not had anything to drink.

To The Voters of Centre County

We, as candidates for re-nomination as County Commissioners, feel that the voters of the county are entitled to an accounting of our stewardship to serve as a guide in the coming elections.

When we went into the Commissioners' office three and a half years ago the County and Institution District were saddled with a debt of \$382,992.72. Through economies in administration, that debt including the payments to be made this year for which funds have been provided, will be reduced to \$172,000.00 and the county is now on a strictly pay-as-you-go basis.

Involved in this record is the paying off of current bills of \$16,891.01 contracted by the former board of Commissioners and unpaid by them when they left office, as well as outstanding notes and other floating obligations of \$54,101.71 in the County Institution District.

We will have been able to reduce the Institution District's bonded debt from \$112,000 to \$52,000, and the county's bonded debt from \$200,000 to \$120,000, including the payment to be made this fall.

This year one mill was cut from the tax rate for county purposes and two mills were cut from the tax for the Institution District. This represents a total saving of approximately \$48,000 this year to the county's taxpayers.

We don't feel that it is unseemly or boastful to point out that to reduce taxes in the face of present conditions calls both for political courage and business ability.

The figures and facts we have given you above are matters of record. They are not the results of mathematical juggling or political word-twisting.

As a result of our experience learned from the sale of lands for taxes, we have concluded that, if re-nominated and re-elected, before any Commissioners' sale is held an effort will be made to ascertain who at the time of the proposed sale are the real owners of the properties returned for sale, and an effort will be made to send them personal notice of the delinquent tax and proposed sale.

This should be done, we feel, because the law as it appears in the statute does not protect anyone who becomes the owner of real estate after the assessment is made and the tax notice from the tax collector is issued.

The notice generally comes in the name of the former owner and there have been times when the new owner received no notice of the tax from the tax collector, and as a result it remained unpaid and later was returned as unpaid and became a property advertised for sale, both by the Treasurer's office and then later by the Commissioners.

We feel that there should be an amendment by the Legislature of the law on this subject but as stated above, an effort will be made to supplement the weakness of the law in this respect as it now appears upon the statute books.

We respectfully ask your consideration of our candidacy for re-nomination for County Commissioner on the Democratic ticket, on September 14.

Firemen from Phillipsburg companies responded to the alarm and were successful in preventing the blaze spreading to the nearby home. Fire department officials reported that there was \$200 insurance on the stable and that the car was insured.

It was the second car lost by Steve Kalina due to fire within the last five weeks. At that time Phillipsburg firemen were called to Hawk Run to extinguish a blazing automobile which reportedly had been taken from the garage by someone attempting to steal the car. It was taken about 100 yards down a grade where it went over an embankment and burned.

MAN KILLED AT TYRONE PLANT

Workman Meets Tragic Death in Explosion of Lime Kiln

John Seborates, 70, met a tragic accident last Wednesday at No. 4 lime kiln of the Tyrone Lins and Stone company, when the front of the kiln was blown out, due to a gas pocket forming inside. The explosion enveloped the victim in flames and made a narrow escape for nine other employees who were working near the kiln at the time.

Owing to the heat and gas developed by the collapsed kiln, it was impossible to get to the imprisoned employe. Fire engine pumps from Tyrone were called and worked hard, pumping from the swimming pool nearby. A power shovel was also brought into play, and employes and residents about Tyrone Forge labored hard to free the man, but without success. The body was finally removed Thursday morning. It is thought Mr. Seborates did not survive much over five minutes after the blast occurred, owing to the lime heat and gases.

Mr. Seborates was a native of Yugoslavia and resided at Northwood. He is survived by a number of step-children.

Man Injured at Shops - Walter B. Overdorf, 50, of Pine Creek, was seriously injured Thursday evening while repairing a locomotive at the New York Central shops at Avis. He was using a heavy bar which slipped, resulting in a compound comminuted fracture of the skull. While his condition is still serious at the Jersey Shore Community Hospital, he is resting as well as can be expected.
