L. C. Heineman Dies Suddenly

(Continued from page one) with Rev. Dr. A. H. Elliott in charge. Interment was made in Homewood cemetery, near Pittsburgh.

For seven years before coming to Bellefonte 17 years ago Mr. Heineman was secretary of the Hilltop YMCA. During his residence in Bellefonte he was prominently identified with many civic and community projects. As secretary of the YMCA he took special interest in the bowling activities and in the swimming pool.

As a swimming instructor he had few equals in this area, and during his 17 years in Bellefonte he, with the aid of Mrs. Heineman, taught a total of more than 1000 persons of all ages to swim. Several weeks ago in an interview, Mr. Heineman told newspapermen that in all his years of experience he had never had a failure in teaching persons to swim.

It was largely through his efforts that the annual Father and Son, and Mother and Daughter banquets were instituted here some years ago. The Father and Son banquet has grown to be probably the most popular single feature on the annual program of the Y.

He was a member of the Bellefonte Kiwanis Club, the Odd Fellows lodge of Pittsburgh, and a Masonic lodge in Bellefonte Chapter No. 241 R. A. M., Nittany Council No. 57, R. and S. M., and was a past commander of Constant's Commandery No. 33, Knights Templar.

Mr. Heineman, who was 65, was born in Pittsburgh, a son of Henry and Minnie Heineman. He is survived by his wife, Hattie E. Williams, two daughters, Mrs. Robert Trumbull, of Wilkensburg, and Mrs. Ralph Haag, Jr., of Buffalo, N. Y., and three grandchildren.

Three brothers also survive, namely: Albert Heineman, of Pittsburgh; Jack Heineman, of Kittanning, and Christopher Heineman, of Mt. Lebanon. A sister, Mrs. J. P. McMullen, died in March.

Prior to coming to Bellefonte Mr. Heineman was a member of the Oakland Presbyterian church, Pittsburgh, was an elder of the church and had served as Sunday school superintendent for fifteen years.

Kindly, mild tempered, conscientious, Mr. Heineman went about his duties in a quiet manner. He could always be depended upon to aid in any project directed toward the betterment of the community. Deeply religious, he seldom missed an opportunity to spread the gospel or to point out some christian teaching in everyday life. He was an avowed foe of intemperance and in his usual address to selectees leaving for army service he never failed to caution them against the evils of intoxicants.

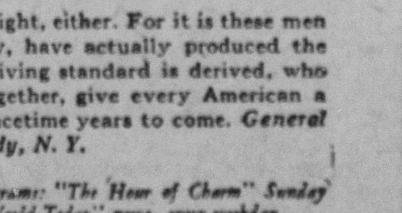
