Democrats Nominate Hipple, Mensch - Henszey, Keeler GOP Nominees

M. Miles, of Union township, for Auditor; Charles Shecker, of Milesburg, for Coroner, and J. Thompson, Henry, of Houston township, for Surveyor.

Of the Democratic registration of 8295, about 3100, or about 35 per cent, voted on Tuesday. The Republican record was somewhat better, for of a registration of 11,982, a total of about 6400, or more than 50 per cent, went to the polls.

Milesburg borough voted to continue to prohibit the sale of liquor in that community, the vote being 151 against sales to 99 for them. In addition, the sale of beer, now permitted there, was voted out, the tally being 141 against beer to 107 for.

Port Matilda, which now permits the sale of both liquor and beer, voted on the liquor sales and the tally was 114 to 104 in favor of continuing such sales in the borough.

Boggs township, whose "Capitol" is Central City, conducted a referendum on both beer and liquor and the count showed that both varieties of beverage will continue to be legal in that district. The vote follows:

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Howard township, in which beer sales are now legal, approved the continuation of beer sales and also voted in favor of permitting liquor sales. The vote on beer was 110 for to 68 against. The vote on liquor was 197 for and 72 against.

As things stack up for the November election, Rudolph Wettstein, Democrat, will be paired off against Jerry Galaida, Republican for Sheriff.

Wettstein polled 1893 votes to defeat his only Democratic opponent, Jesse "Jay" Robinson, of Port Matilda, who had 1114 votes.

Galaida became the G. O. P. nominee by leading a field of five candidates. Galaida had 2398 votes. The next highest candidate, Harry A. Rossman of Milesburg, polled 1888.

Others in the contest were Deputy Sheriff Lee Davis, Bellefonte, 982; Sidney G. Willard, Bellefonte, 749; and C. Roy Heid, Miles township, 392.

Prothonotary Battle: Frederic G. Hoffer, of Phillipsburg, present chief clerk to the County Commissioners, polled a complimentary vote of 2666 to win the unopposed Democratic nomination for Prothonotary. In November he will be paired off against the present incumbent, Bond C. White, of Assam, who polled 3698 Republican votes to defeat Merrill E. Pletcher of Howard, with 1418, and James L.

Adams, of Phillipsburg, with 1108.

Close Vote for Treasurer: Sam Poorman, of Bellefonte, nosed out Sam Biery, of Miles township, for the Democratic nomination for Treasurer, by a vote of 1641 to 1476.

Poorman's opponent for election in November will be the present Sheriff, Edward R. Miller, of Bellefonte, who was high man in a field of five G. O. P. aspirants for the office.

Miller's unofficial count was 2900 as compared with the other candidates' votes, as follows: J. R. Rollie, Williams, 1693; W. Leslie Thomas, Bellefonte, 1138; Fred V. Pletcher, Howard, 789; and former Republican County Chairman Harold D. Cowher, Bellefonte, 764.

Vote for Register: Harry A. Corman, of Spring Mills, unopposed Democratic candidate who seeking re-election as Register, received a complimentary vote of 2900 and in November will be opposed for election by the Republican nominee, Mrs. Lucille S. Ward, of Bellefonte, who recently resigned as Centre County G. O. P. vice-chairman.

Mrs. Ward polled 1659 votes to defeat Charles B. Musser, Bellefonte, with 1572; Harry R. Burd, Aaronsburg, with 1023; Frank K. Stevenson, State College, with 1110; and Clark N. Alkey, Bellefonte, with 825.

Recorder Contest: P. B. "Ben" Meek, of State College, was unopposed for the Democratic nomination for Recorder, and received a vote of 2650. In November he will face Edward R. Woodring of Milesburg, present incumbent of the office, who defeated two other G. O. P. candidates for the nomination. Woodring polled 2434 votes as compared with 2246 received by James H. Schreck, of Lemont, and 1393 registered for Jacob C. Fox, of Unionville.

Mensch, Hipple Win: Fred C. Mensch, of Millheim, and Charles F. Hipple, of Bellefonte, present members of the Board of Commissioners won the Democratic nomination for re-election, defeating the only other candidate, Alfred L. Bowersox, State College. Mensch polled 2122 votes and Hipple had 2024. Bowersox's total was 1297.

The Republicans, with a field of nine candidates to choose from, nominated John H. Henszey of State College, with a vote of 2026, and Harry V. Keeler, present incumbent of Bellefonte, with a vote of 2741.

Council president William W. Sieg, of the North Ward, although he did not choose to run for re-election, won the Democratic nomination with

3 write-in votes, and the Republican nomination with 75 write-in votes. Twenty-five other Republican write-in candidates for Council in the North Ward received from 1 to 5 votes each.

In the South Ward, Democrats nominated William Brachbill for Council with a write-in vote of 13, and W. C. Coxy for the other Council vacancy with a write-in vote of 11. The Republicans of the ward gave Harold D. Cowher, present incumbent, a vote of 275, and also
