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in any community would not be large enough to warrant the establishing of a special class of this type. Grade skipping results in so many additional problems that it is rarely, if ever, advisable. The accelerated pupil is placed with chronologically older and frequently more socially mature pupils, "skipping" may cause him to miss some of the fundamentals taught in the skipped grade.

Enrichment seems to be the more satisfactory method of meeting the needs of the fast learner. Too often parents and teachers have thought of enrichment as supplying additional reading material. This is not the right approach. An enriched program should be based on the child's interests, abilities and needs with plans for a long period of time rather than thought up on the spur of the moment to keep the gifted child busy.

It should be a total program in both physical, emotional and social needs as well as academic needs have been thought through.

The parents of a gifted child should be informed of the child's capabilities and steps taken to prevent them from capitalizing on his endowment to his detriment and to prevent recurring conflicts when adjustments are not made to his unusual abilities.
