CENTRE HALL BOY WRITES FROM SICILY

R. S. Hagan received a letter recently from Pvt. Chalmers Weaver, son of Mr. and Mrs. Orvis Weaver, telling of some of his experiences with the U. S. Armed Forces in Sicily. He says he has been remembering the times spent in the Hagan Garage listening to stories of the last war and he expects to have a tale or two of his own to tell them when he comes back. In describing the Sicilians he says, "The people here are very kind to the American soldiers and an Italian soldier won't fight unless a German soldier has a bayonet in his back. You march into a town where there is no one left but Italians and they come out to greet you like you do when you get a gas customer. One man brought in over a hundred Italian prisoners without firing a shot. They saw him and came down the hill toward him. He didn't know whether to run or not, but he had no trouble." In his letter, written August 19, Pvt. Weaver also speaks of the delicious grapes, peaches, plums and pears on the island. He adds, "We go swimming in the Mediterranean Sea. That's the smallest pool we can find around here." Pvt. Weaver closes his letter with a touch of nostalgia, implying his eagerness to be home soon: "By spring things will be over here and we will be moving on the Japs. That won't take long so by next Christmas we will all be together again."

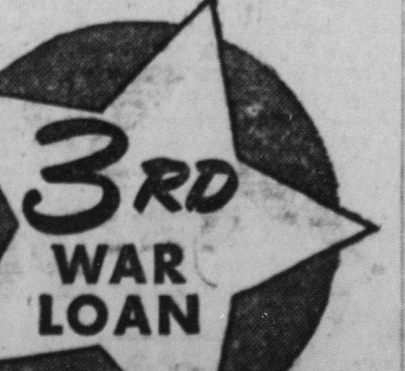
