How Many People Actually Know What a Vitamin Is . . . Well Here Is The Answer

A vitamin is a substance, present in relatively minute quantities in foodstuffs, essential to normal living. When the body is deficient in its supply of any of the vitamins, either because they are not supplied in the diet, or because the body fails to absorb them properly from food, so called "deficiency diseases" arise.

ne 30 years ago, it was believed by most nutrition experts that all that the body needs to get from foods was energy, measured in calories, and supplied by carbohydrates, fats and proteins, certain inerals and certain amino-acids, derived from the breakdown of proteins

When it was discovered that still other substances were required for complete nutrition, the name "vits mine" was coined the standing for "life" and the "amine" indicating the belief of the investigators that all the a sub tences were true amines. As the number of such substances multiplied, they were identified by the letters of the alphabet. A. B. C. D. E. etc.

Later studies show that while all the members of the B complex contain nitrogen, and while some of these are amines, other vitamins were sterol, acids, or alcohols, containing no nitrogen and certaining not amine in nature. Consequently the terminal "e" was dropped. and we obtained our present word "vitamin."
