RAM SALES IMPROVE STATE SHEEP FLOCKS
Good sires are credited by W. B. Connell, livestock extension specialist of the Pennsylvania State College, for a large measure of the improvement in the wool and lamb crops of Pennsylvania in the past 20 years.
Pennsylvania lambs are commanding top prices on eastern markets, while wool improvement features noted are 10 per cent reduction in rejections and a 1 1/2-pound increase in the average weight of fleece.
One of the means of distributing good purebred registered rams is the cooperative sale conducted by sheep and wool growers' associations. Three such sales recently were conducted at New Bethlehem, Carlisle, and Indiana, when approximately 80 rams changed ownership. The quality was high and the top-priced ram sold for \$175.
The largest of the sales scheduled for this year will be at the fair grounds in Mercer on October 9, when 65 rams will be consigned.

FARM CALENDAR

Timely Reminders From The Pennsylvania State College School of Agriculture

Turkeys Go to War—The Army Quartermaster Corps is buying 10 million pounds of turkey to be shipped overseas. Poultry specialists of the Pennsylvania State College say that the turkeys are to be used in Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners to be served American men at every base or fighting front abroad.

Maintain Herd Strength—State and National programs require the control of certain dairy cattle diseases. The success of these programs depends upon careful management and sanitation on the dairy farm. In the opinion of dairy specialists of the Pennsylvania State College, one of the first essentials is a maternity pen.

Fumigate Grain Insects—All grain that is stored should be fumigated soon after it is threshed, say entomologists of the Pennsylvania State College. A mimeographed circular which describes the fumigation and treatment of bins may be obtained from your county agricultural extension association office.

House Maturity Pullets—Some poultrymen find it easier to catch pullets on the range at night when it is time to place them in the laying house. Penn State poultry specialists point out that it is more difficult to select the pullets according to maturity at night.

Prepare Bait Stations—Where there is rank growth of cover crops in the orchard, it is expected that the mouse population may be large this year. Fruit specialists of the Pennsylvania State College urge that bait stations be placed now, and poisoned bait used later.

Water the Evergreens—Be sure to water newly planted evergreens and shrubs until the latter part of September and early October, say ornamental horticulturists of the Pennsylvania State College.

Whitewash
To make whitewash fill a bucket half full of lime and cover it with water to depth of about 2 inches. Let it stand 24 hours to slack, or until the consistency of paste. Dip out desired portion and thin with water to required consistency. A teaspoonful of bluing to a half bucket of whitewash will make it clear and white and a half pint of salt aids in sticking.

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HELPFUL HOUSEHOLD HINTS
KEEPING YOUR WASHER "ON THE JOB"
1 Don't overload the washer. Fill the tub only to the water line and add clothes to the washer's capacity, and no more.
2 When you finish washing, fill tub with clear water, remove the agitator, then drain tub and wipe inside clean with a soft cloth. Don't let dirty water stand in tub overnight.
3 Don't overload the wringer. The rolls are rubber, and doubled-up blankets, buckles, and heavy buttons may damage the rolls.
4 Clean and dry wringer after use and leave in neutral position so pressure is off the rolls.
5 Empty drain hose thoroughly after each use. Avoid sharp bends.
6 A noisy washer may be a washer in need of expert attention. Call a qualified service man if washer does not operate properly.
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
