

A letter from the Assistant Superintendent of Airways called the borough's attention to repairs needed to a beacon atop the hangar at the Bellefonte airport. Some of the wooden supports are rotted and the beacon is in danger of being blown over, it was reported. The special ommittee was directed to investigate.

Burgess Hardman P. Harris' appointment of Reynolds Shope, H. S. Linn and W. J. Emerick to the shade tree commission was approved by Council.

The Water Committee reported collections of \$1721.32 and noted that the reservoir had been cleaned. The Fire and Police Committee reported that parking meter standards had been painted and straightened where necessary.

The police report submitted by Chief Dukeman revealed 32 cars tagged for parking violations; 5 auto investigations; 1 stolen car; 5 transients lodged in lock-up; 8 confidential reports; \$175.80 collected from parking meters and \$7.80 from market fees.

The Sanitary Committee submitted the report of Health Officer W. W. Bickett which showed 5 health certificates issued and 3 eating places inspected.

Possible projects for the post war era were discussed, but no action was taken. Councilmen were urged to devote some time to suggesting worthwhile projects so that in the event of a post-war slump in business, a program of public works will be in readiness
