leather strap and threatened to kill her.
Ralph Macedonia, Jr., 17, living at the home, said he saw his father on an occasion "kick mother in the stomach."
Angelo Macedonia, about 28, of Detroit, Mich., a son by a former marriage, also told of quarrels between his father and his stepmother.
Macedonia stood up at the request of Prothonotary John B. Elliott, when the verdict was being given, and showed no signs of emotion.
Defense Attorney Leo Mullen, who was present when the verdict was brought in, immediately made a motion for arrest of judgment and asked the court for four days in which to file motions for a new trial. This was allowed by Judge Patterson.
The time consumed to try the case required four full days.
The penalty, if carried out, brings a sentence of from 10 to 20 years. Macedonia would not be eligible for parole until ten years of the sentence had been carried out.

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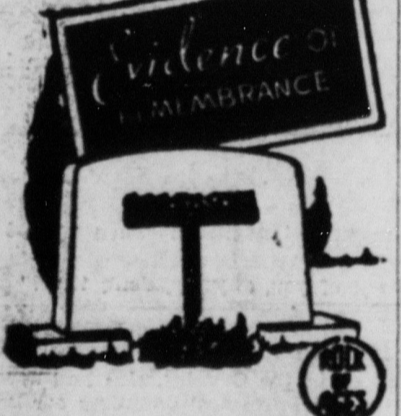
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Disastrous Fire at Lock Haven

merchandise from buildings as a precautionary measure. Because of the intense heat and the rapid spread of flames it was impossible to save any of the stock of the wholesale company. The company does an extensive wholesale grocery business in this area. To what extent the loss was covered by insurance was not announced.
The fire started in the main building and spread to a second structure to the rear located near the railroad. This building was also a part of the wholesale company's housing facilities. The main damage was the burning and collapse of the roof.
Until an accurate check can be made an exact total of the loss cannot be given. W. S. Remick, manager of the company, said.
The normal heavy flow of traffic on Bellefonte avenue was diverted by fire police and little difficulty was experienced, although it was reported that several arrests were made when motorists ran over fire hose.
A huge amount of groceries and other supplies were stored in the buildings. Only Tuesday a company official said, employees had unloaded a carload of oatmeal cereal and one of sugar. Some sugar was saved, but about 50,000 pounds were lost, as well as tremendous quantities of other food. Mild explosions could be heard as cans of precious pineapple juice, pineapple, and other fruits and vegetables "popped" in the heat.
The largest of the warehouses, where the blaze started, was completely ruined, both floors. The other three, although not destroyed, were very much damaged as to both contents and construction. The company furnishes merchandise to Lock Haven stores and in State College, Bellefonte, Avis, Renovo, and many other communities in that area.

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
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
