Silver If silver is to be packed away, rub it well with olive oil, then wrap in old table linen. The silver will not tarnish, but must be washed in hot water before using again.

Sardine Can Start the key in the sardine can in the ordinary way, and then put the tip of the ice pick in the key loop. It will act as a lever and the whole top of the can will pop off easily.

Plant Roots See that the roots of plants as well as the outside growth is given freedom. Crowded roots will cause stunted growth of the plant.

Custards Place a clean marble in the bottom of the cooking utensil when making custards or sauces. This will eliminate the continuous stirring and save time. The marble rolls and bubbles and prevents burning.

Coal Company Pays \$4,172 Back Wages

Forty employees of Morrisdale Coal Mining Co. working at mines near Morrisdale and Hawk Run in Clearfield county, have received a total of \$4,172.84 as back wages due them under the Fair Labor Standards Act and the Walsh-Healey Act. It was announced Monday by Frank J. G. Dorsey, regional director of the Wage-Hour and Public Contracts Division, U. S. Department of Labor. A routine inspection of the company's property revealed some of the employees had not been paid in accordance with the overtime provisions of the two acts, reports Stanton W. Wood, supervising inspector in charge of the Pittsburgh branch office. When this matter was called to the attention of the company officials, they readily cooperated with the division in computing the amounts due and made payment direct to the employees involved on a voluntary basis, Wood said.

Board Studies Assessor List

Assessors may be granted only by the taxing authority, the Board feels. The assessors have no right to omit from the duplicate the names of persons because they, the assessors, believe such persons should not be taxed. School Board members said. Danger of the system of having assessors list only those they believe should be taxed lies in the fact that the tax records are incomplete, and persons removed from the lists upon returning to a taxable condition may be missed in future duplications. Then, too, there is actual loss of tax revenue through having assessors omit names of persons who properly should pay taxes, it was explained.

Another phase of the tax collection system was strengthened, the finance committee said, when committee members, the borough auditors and the tax collector met and established a new and more complete system for recording school tax receipts. It is believed the new system will greatly facilitate the handling of tax records.

The Board voted unanimously to extend the penalty period on school taxes from October 1 to November 1. The extension was granted because tax statements weren't placed in the mails until about September 15, instead of September 1 as is normally the case.
