

HEAR TALK ON HOME REPAIRS

Mysteries of The Saw and Other Tools Explained to Woman's Club

If the instruction received by members of the Bellefonte Women's Club at a regular meeting in the Presbyterian chapel, Monday night, is carried out, the men of this community no longer will have to worry about such household matters as repairing electrical cords and fixtures, spigots, putting up curtain rods, hanging pictures, and mending leaks in the garden hose.

For the principal speaker at the session, David C. Sprague, of the Agricultural Engineering Department of Penn State, spoke most interestingly on "Household Repairs" including the use of the saw, the hammer, and other tools.

Mr. Sprague was assisted in his demonstration by Miss Janet Soisson, home economics representative of the West Penn Power Company, who showed movies of home repairs.

The session was opened in the usual manner by Mrs. Edward Miller, who called for a Salute to the Flag, with Mrs. Christian Harman as leader. Group singing was in charge of Mrs. Ernest Martin, with Mrs. Harry N. Meyer, as accompanist.

Dr. W. L. Shoemaker, Clinton county coroner, who investigated the Long accident, said no inquest would be held. Dr. Shoemaker officiated because the boy died in Clinton county.

An odd coincidence of the Howard accident is that it happened just one year less a day, after an accident at the Jacksonville crossroads in which Arlene Swope, 14, of near Jacksonville was killed, and Richard Allison, 16, and William Fulton, 14, both of Howard, suffered severe head injuries.

The Allison boy had been in Long's car Sunday morning, until a few days before it crashed. Mrs. Lola Fulton, who took Long to the hospital, is the mother of William Fulton who was seriously injured in the accident a year ago.
