Mrs. Tillie Elmira Peck, well known Nittany Valley citizen, died at 5:30 o'clock Tuesday morning, November 2, 1943, at the home of her son, Earl H. Peck, at Nittany, of complications. Mrs. Peck, who had not been well for about a year, was bedfast two weeks. She was a daughter of Henry and Catherine Yearick and was born in Jacksonville on February 19, 1866, making her age at time of death 77 years, 8 months and 13 days. On May 23, 1893, she was united in marriage with Edwin J. Peck who until his death some time ago conducted a general store at Nittany for many years. Surviving is a son, Earl H. Peck, at home, and a sister, Mrs. Ida Holmes of Flemington. She was a lifelong member of the Jacksonville Reformed church. Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon at the home with Rev. John Guille of Howard officiating. Interment will be made in the Jacksonville cemetery.

Urges Mailing X-mas Cards in November
In a bulletin issued by the U. S. Postoffice Department, it is reported that there can be no assurance in view of unavoidable handicaps of war, that gifts and cards mailed the weeks immediately preceding Christmas will be delivered on time. Such matter must not impede the movement of military mail and war materials, it is pointed out. Transportation facilities are heavily burdened, and the number of planes and railway cars available for carrying Christmas mail is far below that of former years. More than 30,000 postal employees have gone into the armed forces. Many of the 200,000 temporary employees usually hired at Christmas time, are not available this year to help with the holiday mails, it is explained. The bulletin concludes with the statement that the only way the Christmas mails can be handled is by spreading them out over a longer period before the holiday. Use of delivery zone numbers on addresses also will help inexperienced postal employees in speedy deliveries. The department strongly advises the public to mail Christmas gifts and cards in November. Gifts should be marked "Do Not Open Until Christmas."

mittee, and keep you currently advised of our efforts to collect the dust emanating from our plant. Therefore, we take this opportunity to advise you the board of directors of Warner Company has appropriated \$32,000 to the Bellefonte Division for the purchase of a large centrifugal dust collector for our No. 3 rotary kiln, of the same type that is already installed and in operation on our No. 2 rotary kiln. The order for this collector will be placed immediately upon securing the necessary priority from Washington, which we are advised will be forthcoming. We want to briefly outline the progress made in combating the dust problem since the installation of our large collector on No. 2 rotary kiln in 1941. In addition there was a small collector installed the same year on our stone cleaning plant. During 1942 extensive experiments were carried out on our No. 3 rotary kiln, but no major expenditures were made due to priority regulations, although a small collector was installed on our stone drying plant with only mediocre success. So far this year we have installed a new cloth type collector to replace these two other inefficient collectors and this new collector appears to be doing

At present we have in operation in our plant six dust collectors and motors totaling 235 h. p. are required to operate them. The majority of these collectors run 24 hours per day. Within a few weeks we expect delivery of another cloth type collector to be installed on our raw lime tanks, which have been a source of considerable dust. After the installation of this collector and the large centrifugal collector on No. 3 rotary kiln, we shall be consuming 340 h. p. for operating our dust collecting equipment. It has been a difficult problem to show very much progress on our dust elimination program during these trying times, but we feel confident these new installations will materially decrease the dust escaping from our plant.
