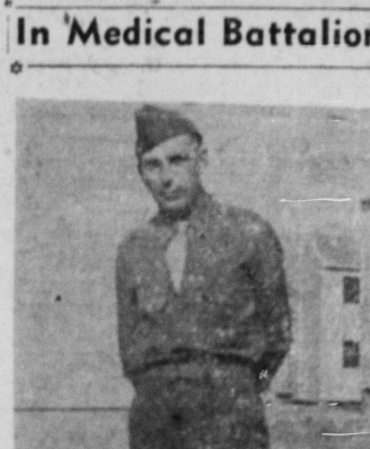

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Must Report All Foreign Holdings

Citizens of Bellefonte who own any property in foreign countries were notified by Postmaster George R. Meek today that they must file reports of their foreign holdings with the Treasury Department before December 1. The notice was given by means of a poster placed on display in the postoffice.

Postmaster Meek points out that it is necessary for the government to have as complete information as possible on the American stake abroad to assist the military authorities and the civilian governments on the fighting fronts and to bring about sound solutions of the post-war problems.

Report forms, known as TFR-590, may be obtained through commercial banks, or from the nearest Federal Reserve Bank, the postmaster states. Penalties are provided for those who willfully fail to file reports.

LIQUOR RATIONING TO START SOON IN STATE

Chairman Frederick T. Geider, of the Liquor Control Board, indicated a possibility that liquor will be rationed in Pennsylvania shortly but declined to say when.

One report was that retail customers will be allowed about a fifth of a gallon of whiskey in a stated period—three weeks or a month—with licenses continuing to get their share of available merchandise through the present restricted quota system.

Sales of plentiful rums, biters, foreign wines, except sparkling wines and domestic table wines will be unrestricted as at present.
