Dr. J. W. Claudy Is Speaker at Meeting

Speaker of the evening was Dr. John W. Claudy, superintendent of Rockview Penitentiary, whose topic was "The Home and the Community." Dr. Claudy declared that the alarming increase in juvenile delinquency in metropolitan areas most probably will result in a wave of gangsterism after the war.

Juveniles today, he said, are not the usual "teen-age youngsters, but are those under 'teen age who under normal conditions would be under the care of their parents. Many parents today, engaged in war industries and other pursuits, can't keep proper watch over their families, he said, adding that no one has come forward with a workable solution to the problem at this time.
