### Writes of Early Days at Scotia

100 feet long and 70 feet wide and valued by the owners at about \$4,400, later developed into one of the largest industrial enterprises in the world, sold 43 years later for nearly \$500,000.00.

The Klonan forse was the nucleus of today's Carnegie-Illinois Steel Corporation, the world's largest steel producing company.

Thomas M. Carnegie, Andrew Carnegie's younger brother, became a partner of the Klonan concern in 1864, and in the same year Andrew Carnegie joined Thomas M. Miller in construction of a new mill. On May 1, 1865, the two plants were merged to form the Union Iron Mill Company. The firm name then became Carnegie, Phillips & Company Limited, in 1886.

With each change of the firm name the company increased its capitalization and expanded its operations. A new firm, Carnegie Brothers & Company, Ltd., was organized on April 1, 1881, with a capitalization of \$5,000,000.

In 1871 Henry Clay Frick, a young man, decided to start in the iron business and he organized the firm of P. L. & Company with 300 acres of coal lands and a plant of 50 ovens. In 1889 the same company owned and controlled nearly 10,000 ovens and 35,000 acres of coal land.

Mr. Frick then joined the Carnegie's when he was 33 years old, and the annual earning power of the company increased under his direction from \$1,941,555 to \$49,025,000 in a few years. Mr. Frick effected the consolidation of the Carnegie interests and on July 1, 1892 the Carnegie Steel Company, Limited, was incorporated.

As the result of a meeting in Atlantic City, N. J., on March 17, 1900, the Carnegie Steel Company and the H. C. Frick Coke Company were merged to form the Carnegie Steel Company.

The United States Steel Corporation purchased Carnegie Steel Company in 1901, the total value of the transaction being \$469,416,640, or 100,000 times the cash value of Klonan's little forge 40 years before.

And that was the start of Carnegie's in the iron ore business which led to the opening of the Scotia ore mines many years afterwards. Scotia became one of the largest ore producing and ore washers in Central Pennsylvania at that time, and the largest in Centre county.

After Carnegie had purchased all the holdings of Lyon-Shorb Company in Pittsburgh as well as all holdings at Pennsylvania Furnace, he came east to inspect all of the holdings here. He made some improvements at Pennsylvania Furnace which could be better told by some of the older residents of that community.

He also had a lease on the Hostler bank where there was a very good grade of ore, and the prospecting there showed one large pocket. However, the land around about was not so good and was soon given up
