North American missionary agencies and boards serving in Japan, and members of the Foreign Missions Conference of N. Y. are in unanimous agreement that when it is again possible to re-enter Japan with missionaries and Christian institutions, they shall enter cooperatively instead of as separate denominations and agencies. This decision is generally considered one of the foremost steps yet contemplated for united action by American Protestant churches in the Orient, and there is hope that the missionary groups may be able to achieve such cooperation in other fields, even in countries where the service of missionaries has been relatively undisturbed by war conditions.

Dr. C. Bertram Rappe, Methodist missionary-superintendent in the city of Chungking, West China, reports that when the youngest son of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek was recently baptized a Christian by Bishop W. Y. Chen, in the Central Methodist church of that city, the Generalissimo gave the young soldier a copy of Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick's "The Meaning of Faith," saying, "You must know what you believe." Then, before the lad left for the front, he gave him a copy of the Bible and a copy of Fosdick's "The Meaning of Faith," adding, "I am sure that if he wanted to be a real Christian he must learn to be of service to his fellow men."

According to leaders of town and city missionary work in all parts of the United States, the migration of millions of peoples in this country due to industry and the war not only creates a problem of "churching" at the present time but will present an even greater problem after the war. Some towns and cities (and that means their churches also) have lost many residents, while other towns have had a mushroom growth and almost all large cities are overcrowded. New churches are badly needed in thousands of communities. But, ask these leaders, will the depopulated towns regain their inhabitants after the war? Or will new areas and types of industries demand new communities and new churches where people do not now live? On the answer to these questions depend much of the future plans of all major denominations, but no one has the answer to the questions.
