ALFALFA HAY IS GOOD FEED FOR LAYING HENS

In addition to vitawill be charged but a silver offering min A, properly cured alfalfa hay contains protein and minerals. The second and third cuttings are better for poultry than the first cutting. The better the hay, the more feedng value. Second-growth clover and

soybean hay also can be used. According to extension poutry specialists of the Pennsylvania State College, many poultry farmers feed the hay as it comes from the mow. putting it on the floor of the laying pen. However, less hav will be wasted if it is-put in a container made of coarse poultry netting or woven wire fencing and placed where the hens can reach it easily. Most poultrymen like to cut it up fine with

an ensilage or straw cutter. When pullets are housed they are likely to get no green feed or roughage, such as they picked up on the range. For this reason, it would seem desirable to feed some of the legume have daily, after the pullets are housed, Aside from the feeding value of the hay, it supplies roughage and keeps the birds busy picking at something, thus aiding to some extent at least in controlling canni-


