fonte Community Welfare Fund will set the date of the next campaign ahead six months, instead of holding another drive in May, 1944. The next campaign will not be held until next fall, officials stated.

Although those in charge of the present drive are pleased with the results it is hoped that additional money will be received. A number of organizations had not turned in their cards when reports were completed today. Groups which have not finished their soliciting are asked to do so at once and report results to Mary Harvey Scott, secretary, at her office in the Y. M. C. A. building. Totals for the various divisions of the drive are as follows:

Initial gifts, \$10,434; industry, \$6,649.59; commerce, \$2,541.01; home soliciting, \$912.55.

New contributions under industry are Rockview Penitentiary, \$226.50; Whitlock Quarries employees, \$11.50; Old-Time Bakery employees, \$75; Pennsylvania Railroad Company employees, \$76; Warner Company employees, additional, \$39.50.

New contributions under commerce are West Penn Power Company employees, \$23; drug store employees, \$22; eating place employees, \$32; Penn Belle Hotel employees, \$60; newspaper and motion picture employees, \$60; secretaries and bank employees, \$9; garage employees, \$10.
