HAROLD E. THOMPSON
Funeral services for Harold E. Thompson, a son of Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Thompson, of State College, and a member of the faculty of Norris-town High School, Norris-town, were held Monday morning in that city. Mr. Thompson who died suddenly at his home Wednesday night, December 1, 1943, was 48. Interment was in Riverside cemetery, Norris-town. He had been a teacher in Norris-town for 16 years. He was born in Highland Falls, N. Y., and graduated from Penn State in 1921. Surviving in addition to his parents are his wife, Auna Sara Thompson, and three children: Harold E., Jr., a naval air cadet; Theodore K., and Terry Auna, at home.

MRS. WILLIAM K. OSMAN
Mrs. William K. Osman, Jr., of Osman street, State College, died suddenly of a heart attack Monday morning, December 6, 1943, in Mercy Hospital, Altoona. Mrs. Osman, who had been in ill health, had just been granted a leave of absence from the college. She worked as personal secretary in the office of S. K. Hostetter, in charge of business and finance. Her husband, who has been in the army for several months and who was on maneuvers in Louisiana at the time of his wife's death, has been called home. Mrs. Osman, formerly Lorraine Tarr, was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Earl G. Tarr, formerly of Beltsano, now of Patton. Her husband and parents are the sole survivors. She had been employed by the college since 1935.

GEORGE EDWARD MILLER
George Edward Miller, retired farmer of Millheim, died at his home in that community at 5 o'clock Friday morning, December 2, 1943. Although he had not been in good health for some time, he was up and about until about ten days before his death. A son of Michael and Margaret Lambert Miller, he was born in Miles township on October 25, 1864, making his age at time of death 79 years, 1 month and 8 days. On August 11, 1887 he married the former Katie Olive Smull, who survives with two children, Charles A., at whose home he lived, and Miss Sadie S. Miller, of Philadelphia. He was the last member of his family and was a member of the Lutheran church. Funeral services were held at the home Monday afternoon with Rev. J. S. Shannon officiating.
