The blue signal was sounded at 10:50 p. m., followed by the red or danger at 11 p. m., the second blue at 11:15, and the white or all-clear at 11:27 p. m. No incidents were reported in either Bellefonte or State College. Public response to the blackout was only fair in Bellefonte, with a number of cases of lights being left on reported. In State College 85 per cent of the Civilian Defense workers turned out. Dr. J. F. Shigley, chairman of the Defense Council, announced, Dr. Shigley indicated that more surprise drills are to be expected at any time.
