Issues Ultimatum On Lime Dust Evil (Continued from page one)
during the year. The following is a list of the expenditures and the efforts put forth by the Warner Company toward the elimination of this problem:
"Experiments on collectors for No. 1 kiln in 1942, expended \$1946.15. This did not include the purchase of any collectors.
"Dust conveyor on No. 2 kiln in 1942, expended \$693.11.
"H. P. Motor 5, Pratt Daniel replacing Norble collector, 1942 expenditures \$4476.99.
"Six collector to replace Norble and Pratt Daniel, 1943 expenditures \$6000.00.
"Six collector on raw lime tank, 1943 expenditures \$4500.00. H. P. Motor 5, Pratt Daniel collector ordered and priority secured for No. 3 kiln cost \$32,000.00. H. P. Motor 100. This collector was ordered recently and, as yet, we do not have the shipping date.
"Three are three main stacks at the Warner Company plant, some of which we believe is the main source of the dust problem. No. 1 stack is partly under dust collection. No. 2 has a Pratt Daniel collector on it and is collecting tons of dust every day. No. 3 has no collector on but you will note above that a collector has been ordered for same.
"We have endeavored to cooperate with the citizens of the borough and the Warner Company in trying to solve this dust problem. Each meeting with the Warner Company we have tried to present the feelings of the borough citizens, as expressed by the hundreds of complaints that dust is detrimental to the health and welfare of our community, as well as destructive to property.
"Therefore, as Chairman of the Special Committee, I pledge to the citizens of Bellefonte, that if the Warner Company does not have collectors installed, or in process of installing within the next six months that will greatly reduce this dust problem, I will recommend to the Borough Council that an injunction be issued against the Warner Company, and if the Borough Council refuses to back this recommendation, I will resign as Chairman of the Special Committee and organize a Citizens Committee.
