W. HARRY MACKER

W. Harry Macker, of West High street, Bellefonte, who for many years conducted a taxi service in this community, died at the Centre County Home here at 6 o'clock Wednesday evening, January 5, 1944. He had been in failing health for two years and was admitted to the home on December 29. Deceased, who was aged 66 years, was a son of Patrick and Jane Patton Macker and was born in Pine Grove Mills. Surviving is his wife, the former Anna M. Rockey. Many years ago Mr. Macker conducted a green grocery business for a short time in the room on the Diamond now occupied by the Central Pennsylvania Gas Company offices. Later he entered the taxi business, continuing in that vocation for a number of years. More recently he had conducted a stand at the Bellefonte Curb Market. Funeral services were held at the Widdowson Funeral Home here Friday afternoon, with Rev. Harry C. Stenger, Jr., of the Methodist church, officiating. Interment was made in the Union cemetery, Bellefonte.
