J. Thomas Mitchell Writes History of Bar

(Continued from page one) of the borough. He died in 1938. Woodring was chiefly interested in land law and surveying. In this work he was involved in the preparation of several of our large election cases. A sudden attack of blindness put an end to his career as a lawyer, but he finally consented to serve as a most efficient justice of the peace for Bellefonte borough until the time of his death in 1937.

1904-1915: Term of Judge Ellis Lewis Orvis

The first new members admitted under this judicial term were James C. Furst, a son of Judge Austin O. Furst, in 1906, and Charles A. McClure in 1907. Furst, who 21 years later became our Judge, began practice with his father, who died in the same year. Since then he has practiced alone in the same offices which his father had occupied. McClure moved at once to Philadelphia, established a practice there, and has become quite well known in that city.

Frank Aruman was indicted for murder and placed on trial at the May Sessions of 1925.

Samuel D. Gettig, secured an acquittal, John Strabilla was indicted for murder at the May Sessions of 1924, at which trial John G. Love assisted the new District-Attorney Arthur C. Dale, and Gettig, Runkle and Margioli represented the defendant, who was acquitted. At the September Sessions in 1924 came the trial of Harry Musser for murder. The counsel in the above case again represented the prosecution while Spangler & Walker for Samuel D. Gettig were for the defense. A second-degree verdict followed. At the same term, with the same counsel, the new firm of Orvis & Zerby, obtained an acquittal.

1916-1925: Term of Judge Henry Crosby Quigley and Judge Arthur C. Dale

Arthur C. Dale was the first member to be admitted to our Bar under Judge Quigley, in 1917, while John G. Love was admitted in 1921. Dale began his practice under the tutelage of his father, Clement Dale, and later formed a member of the firms of Orvis & Dale, and of Orvis, Zerby & Dale. Still later he re-established his practice alone. Love immediately started his own practice, which lasted until he formed a partnership with Roy Wilkinson, Jr., that began in 1940.

1926-1935: Term of Judge Clyde Auman, William D. Zerby and Harry C. Quigley

William D. Zerby was admitted in the same year, 1904. He was a hard student and a good lawyer. Progressively, he belonged to the firms of Gettig, Bower & Zerby, of Orvis & Zerby, and of Orvis, Zerby & Dale. He made his mark early both as a good consultant and a good trial lawyer. He died in 1925.

1936-1943: Term of Judge Peter Rider

Frank Rider was admitted in 1908 and D. Paul Fortney, a son of David F. Fortney, in 1910. Fleming practiced for 20 years, or until his elevation to the bench, with his office in Philadelphia, and shortly after the end of his judicial term formed a partnership with William W. Litke, as Fleming & Litke, with offices in Bellefonte. Fortney joined with his father in the firm of Fortney & Fortney for the next six years, and shortly after the end of that time became connected with the Western Penitentiary for some years.

1944-1950: Term of Judge James Russell Harris

James Russell Harris, a former Bellefonte boy, whose family lived in the house torn down and replaced by the present Bell Telephone building was chosen, and his plans for the remodeling adopted. The work was begun in 1909 and completed in the following year.
