### J. FRANK GRAY.

J. Frank Gray, 83, a native of Bellefonte, died Tuesday evening, January 28, at the Williamsport hospital, where he had been a medical patient two days. Born Dec. 9, 1860, at Bellefonte, he went to Jersey Shore in 1885, to engage in the drug business. In 1905 he left the drug business to enter the service of the New York Central Railroad Company, from which he retired Dec. 31, 1930. Funeral services were held Saturday morning, followed by burial in the Jersey Shore cemetery.

Hezekiah Walker, retired stone mason of Yarnell, died at the Centre County Home here at 6 p. m. Thursday, January 27, 1944.
