ANNOUNCE TEST FOR ARMY-NAVY SERVICE

The third Army-Navy College qualifying test for the Army Specialized Training Program and the Navy College Program V-12 which will be given throughout the country on Wednesday, March 15 at 9 a. m. will be administered at the Centre Hall-Potter High School, Room 5, J. F. Wetzel, principal, announced today. A leaflet of general information which contains an admission-identification form may be obtained at the office in the high school building. This form properly filled out will admit to the test students between the ages of 17 and 21 inclusive who are high school graduates or who will be graduated by July 1, 1944. Intent to take the test should be made known immediately to J. F. Wetzel in order that the necessary test supplies may be ordered.

The same examination will be taken by both Army and Navy candidates. The examination is designed to test the aptitude and general knowledge required for the program of college training and all qualified students are urged to take the test. At the time of the test each candidate will be given a choice of service preference, but taking the test does not obligate the candidate to enlist in the service.

6. Is it correct to eat patty shells?

7. Should one start a conversation if one sits down next to a friend in a bus or streetcar, if this friend is reading a book?

8. Should one avoid smoking if one knows that the hostess disapproves of it?

9. Is it proper to always leave a portion of food on the plate after finishing a meal?

10. Isn't it crude to use the phrase "Pleased to meet you" when being introduced?

11. What does "demode" mean?

12. Should one comment on the food that is served when calling on a friend?

Answers

1. "Goodbye, Mr. Jones. I am very glad to have met you," or "Goodbye, Mrs. Smith. I hope that I shall see you again soon."

2. No. If he refuses, do not insist. But a guest, who is tactful, will not refuse even though he is not partial to what is offered.

3. The present tense should be used both for the invitation and the reply.

4. No: this is not necessary and a repetition of this kind is usually tiresome.

5. Certainly.

6. Yes, if they are made of pastry, and they should be eaten with the fork.

7. The initiative should be taken by the person reading, and he should decide whether to continue reading or conversing with you.

8. Yes: try to conform to the likes and dislikes of the hostess as long as you are her guest.

9. No: this is not necessary.

10. Yes: merely say, "How do you do?" Sometimes one can add "I have heard my sister (brother, husband) speak of you often, or some such phrase.

11. It is a French word that means "out of date." Pronounce da-mo-da, both a's as in day, o as in no, principal accent on last syllable.

12. Yes, especially if she can praise some dish that she knows her hostess has taken trouble to prepare.
