Nursing Activities Committee in Meeting

The Nursing Activities committee of Bellefonte Chapter Red Cross met last Thursday afternoon in the nursing room in Petriken Hall with Mrs. George B. Thompson, committee chairman, president.

Miss Rimmer, chapter nurse, reported 111 visits for the month of January, indicating 66 children tested for sight and hearing defects in Howard and Hubersburg schools. Medical inspection of these schools will come later. Miss Rimmer is teaching a class of 19 senior and junior girls in home nursing at the Bellefonte High School.

Following Miss Rimmer's report an educational discussion on venereal diseases was held by committee members, and Miss Rimmer read an informative article on syphilis, outlining the danger incurred in neglecting to have treatment, how it can be cured if treated properly and how it has incapacitated the service men. She reported that a large percentage of cripples and insane in our institutions today are attributable to the disease either through contact or inheritance.

James A. Fox Succumbs Here

(Continued from page one) and Science and was graduated with the class of 1914. He was a member of Zeta Delta Chi fraternity.

Following his graduation he was associated with the Blair Drug Store in Philadelphia until he enlisted in the United States Army in April, 1918. After preliminary training with the Medical Department at Ft. Oglethorpe, Georgia, he served on a hospital train with the American forces overseas for a period of 18 months. He was honorably discharged from the Army December 11, 1919.

After completion of military service, he returned to Bellefonte and became associated with his brother-in-law, the late C. M. Parrish, in the Parrish Drug Store. Upon the death of Mr. Parrish in 1932, Mr. Fox purchased the business and continued the operation of the store. In April 1933 he sold a half interest in the business to a brother-in-law, E. Leroy Plumb.

In addition to his partnership in the drug store, Mr. Fox was the sole owner of the Bellefonte Laboratories, a wholesale drug business. The deceased was a parishioner of St. John's Catholic church, Bellefonte. He was a member of the American Legion, the Logan Fire Company, the Bellefonte Chamber of Commerce, the National Association of Retail Druggists, and the National, State, and Central Pennsylvania Pharmaceutical Associations.

The late Mr. Fox was the youngest of seven children, of whom Rose Fox Parrish, now deceased, wife of the late C. M. Parrish, was the oldest. He is survived by four sisters, Mary Fox Gearhart, Anne M. Fox, Alice C. Fox, and Helen Fox Plumb, and one brother, Joseph L. Fox, all of Bellefonte.
