Inflation May Halt Farm Loans

have been approved for the Farm Ownership loans, but are unable to locate satisfactory farms at reasonable prices.

"Right now these families are in the market for seven farms," Alexander said. "Unless they find them soon—and at prices which reflect long-run value—the loan funds allocated to this county will be used elsewhere in the state or turned back to the Federal treasury."

"The farms which these families are searching for must be large enough to support a family adequately, but not large enough to require much hired labor. Of course they must have adequate buildings and water facilities. Above all, the price must be a farmer's—not a profiteer's—price."

Alexander said that the FSA County Advisory Committee, consisting of three prominent farmers, would inspect and approve each farm bought with a Farm Ownership loan.

Farm Loan Group To Meet Monday

The members of the Centre County National Farm Loan Association have been advised that the annual meeting of the association will be held in the Court House in Bellefonte on Monday morning, February 21, in accordance with the bylaws of the association.

The board of directors of the association composed of James J. Markle, of State College; George J. Fetterolf and Morris Burkholder, both of Centre Hall; Gilbert C. Waite, of Port Matilda, and Ward C. Krape, of Zion, met in the association's office on High street, Bellefonte, to make plans for this meeting.

In addition to reports of the directors and the secretary-treasurer concerning the activities of the association during 1943, the meeting will be addressed by Colonel Dobbins of the Federal Land Bank of Baltimore, who will enlarge upon the importance of farm credit.

The directors have also invited to this meeting Guy W. Corman, teacher of Vo-Ag in the Bellefonte High School; Kyle Alexander, representative of the Farm Security Office; William Rishel, chairman of the War Board Committee; William J. Tucker, supervisor of Vo-Ag Education in Centre and Clearfield counties; Harry Corman, director of Production Credit Association; Ralph C. Blaney, county agent, and Dr. Miles H. Cubbon, representative of the Soil Conservation Office.

Mr. Krape, president of the association, stated that it was most important at this time for all farm organizations to cooperate for their mutual benefit, and that they should take every opportunity to familiarize themselves with the various services rendered by each organization. It is anticipated that the meeting will be one of great interest to all who attend.

The board of directors of the association join in extending an invitation to all interested farmers to attend this meeting whether they belong to the association or not.

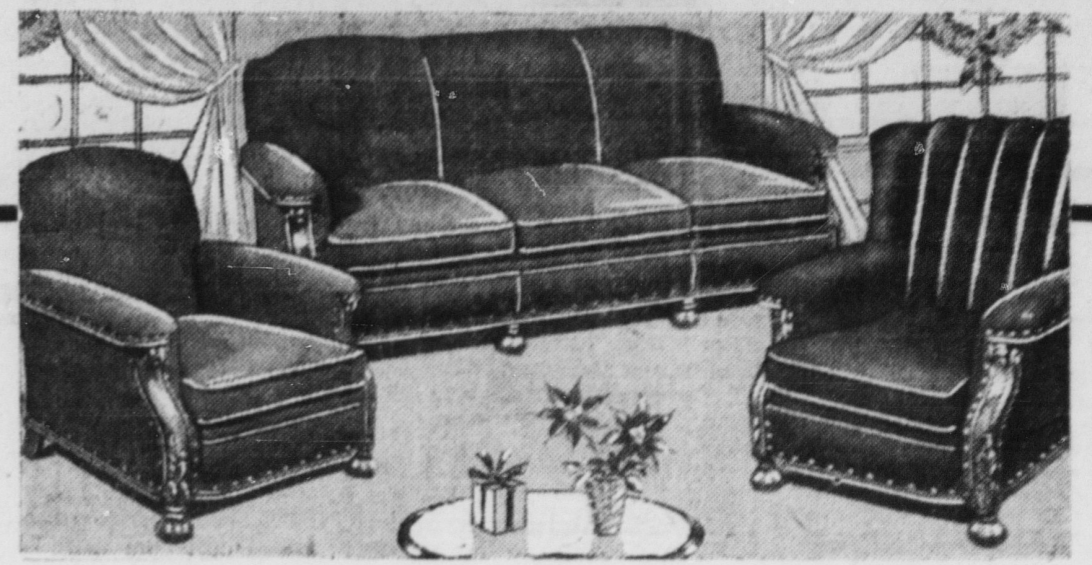
