Spring Sales In Full Swing

Even though wartime conditions have created a great scarcity of two farm essentials, farm machinery and farm labor, the county's farmers are overcoming those difficulties as best they can in order to do their share toward providing food to win the war.

As a result, most of the farm sales listed this month are sales resulting not from discouragement with farming, but for the normal reasons that prevail annually—desire to locate on another farm, retirement from active life, change in ownership or management, and change from one type of farming to another.

For those who are seeking farm machinery to buy, the columns of the Public Sale Register in this newspaper provide a vast source of supply. Among the descriptive advertisements can be found every type and kind of farm machine for sale, and in many instances such items can be found at a sale close to home. Livestock of all breeds and types likewise is to be found in abundance.

One of the longest descriptive sale advertisements ever to appear in the Register is being published currently. It is for the two-day sale of livestock, farm machinery and household goods to be held by J. B. Strunk, west of Mill Hill, on March 16 and 17.

Mr. Strunk is retiring from farming and expects to dispose of his entire herd of cattle, which is known as an exceptionally fine herd. Hundreds of items of farm goods and household articles are listed in his advertisement.

In addition, there are many other advertisements listing farm machinery—in variety and type to suit the needs of practically any farm.

Prices so far this season have been comparatively high, especially for items for which there is a heavy demand because of the war. In certain types of machinery the OPA has established ceiling prices so that the purchaser is protected from unreasonable high prices. This restriction imposes injustice in some cases, but in overall operation it serves as a sharp control on price.

Because the Centre Democrat Sale Register is so widely recognized in this and adjoining counties as the best possible public sale advertising medium, more and more farmers who schedule sales are coming to consider a descriptive advertisement in the Register several weeks before the sale as the No. 1 necessity for a successful sale. The short-notice notices, which sometimes are placed many months before the sale date, serve to advertise the sale and at the same time reserve the date, preventing others in the same local-

ity from scheduling their sales for the same day.

The cost of such advertisements is money well spent, for every successful sale depends upon competitive bidding. The more bidders present, the more chance there is that every item offered will bring its real value.

REPORTS LARGE GAIN IN FARMERS' COOPERATIVE

Farmers in nine northeastern states purchased more supplies co-

operatively through the Eastern States Farmers' Exchange during 1943 than in any previous year, according to M. W. Wert, of Rebersburg, who has just returned from Springfield, Mass., where he attended the 26th annual meeting of his cooperative purchasing association. He was re-elected to the board of directors for a term of three years.

There are in this state about 29,600 members of the Farmers' Exchange who, during 1943, called on their cooperative to purchase for them 231,348 tons of dairy, poultry and livestock feeds, 13,320 tons of fertilizer and fertilizer materials, 2,822,004 pounds of spray materials, 27,024 gallons of motor oil and large amounts of many other supplies.

Eastern States Farmers' Exchange

is now providing a cooperative purchasing service for about 100,000 members and patrons. Through it they have accumulated several million dollars' worth of facilities including an ultra-modern feed mill, grain storage elevator and seed refinery and storage house at Buffalo, N. Y., and fertilizer plants at Wilmington, Del., and Cambridge, Mass.

Part-Time Jobs Now Available At Titan

Lee V. Alexander, manager of the United States Employment Service of the War Manpower Commission, reports that the Titan Metal Company is accepting men who are now

employed by other concerns to assist in unloading cars of material at night and on Sundays.

A critical shortage in freight cars for the transportation of war material has made this action necessary. A force of approximately 20 workers will be maintained to keep the flow of material constant so that production schedules may be maintained and freight cars may be released for further service, Mr. Alexander stated.

Men with sturdy physiques will have an opportunity to earn money in addition to their present income and demonstrate their loyalty to the boys, who are carrying the burden of the war on foreign battlefields. A number of men have already signed up for the job and

more are expected to respond in the near future.

Mr. Alexander further stated that interested persons could apply to the United States Employment Service at the Undine Fire Company or direct to the local plant since statements of availability are not needed for part time work.
