Boro. to Collect Excess Garbage

ular service from a private agency will be taken on by the borough agency.

4. In the first collection, borough trucks will be permitted to haul away accumulations of refuse, but after the first trip garbage only will be taken.

To apply for the service residents are instructed to call the Borough office, dial 2448, at the earliest possible time so that routes can be outlined for the first trip, Monday. Persons who mix garbage with ashes or other refuse after the initial pick-up will be refused further service by borough trucks. The service will not be extended to hotels, restaurants and other large sources of refuse, since all of them are adequately served by private agencies.

The borough-operated service was proposed by Councilman Walter Eberhart. The vote was unanimous. Councilman Newell B. Long pointed out that after the war, the garbage situation will clear up of its own accord as manpower and equipment becomes available.

The garbage ordinance, which was drawn up in contemplation of a monopoly contract to a private agency, defined garbage, set forth the ways in which garbage could be disposed of legally, outlined rules for collection and containers, gave specifications for the type of truck in which it could be hauled, and set up a plan of billing and collection.

The ordinance was tabled upon motion by Mr. Eberhart, seconded by Councilman Newell B. Long.

J. E. Walters, of Bellefonte, who has been collecting garbage and ashes in town, and who offered two weeks ago to collect garbage, only at a rate of \$1.50 a month, appeared in Council just after the motion for the borough system was passed, and offered to take over garbage collection at \$1 a family a month, with individuals furnishing their own cans. Councilmen pointed out to him that under his system garbage disposal would cost each family \$12 a year and they had additional cost in disposing of ashes and other refuse. Mr. Walters was assured that the borough would not "steal" any customers from him.

"We don't want to haul garbage," Councilman Eberhart said. "We're doing it only because other agencies have failed, and because garbage must be cleared away. If anyone takes our customers away from us, it will make us very happy."

Councilman Leslie Thomas presided over the session as president pro tem, in the absence of William W. Sieg.

At the suggestion of Mayor Hardman P. Harris, Council approved plans for observance of "I Am An American Day," Sunday, May 21, with a street parade and possibly other ceremonies. Council also approved the appointment of the following committee: with Karl E. Kause, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, as chairman; Charles A. Eckenroth, commander of Brooks-Doll Post American Legion; John Bryan, commander of Jackson-Crisman-Saylor Post Veterans of Foreign Wars; Earl K. Stock, supervising principal of schools, and newspapermen Thomas A. Mensch, Jack H. Yeager and Paul M. Dubbs.

Contractor Benjamin Bradley appeared in Council on behalf of Nicola Lalli, who wants permission to remodel the front of his building on South Allegheny street, and install an outside collar steps from the sidewalk to the basement. The Special committee is to meet with Mr. Bradley on the site to go over the plans.

Chief of Police Dukeman read the police report showing 68 cars tagged for parking violations, 3 accident investigations, 1 transient in the lockup, 1 arrest for a bad check, 4 confidential reports, \$200.88 from meter collections, and 20 cents from market fees.

The Fire and Police reports showed that total payments on parking meters to date are \$9,266.90, with a balance of \$2,407.25 remaining to be paid. If meter collections hold their present average, the meters will be paid in full this year, and after that time all receipts will go into the borough coffers.

Council approved appointment by the Undine Fire Company of A. L. Francis as a member of the board of control of the Firemen's Relief

Association to succeed the late Harold D. Cowher, and the appointment by Chief Basil A. Doll of Charles Wayne as an assistant chief.

Health Officer Karl E. Kause's report showed 18 health certificates issued, 65 to 70 complaints about non-removal of garbage, inspection of four eating places, and one complaint about a broken sewer in the business district.

Ordinances preparing the way for the condemnation of tracts of land owned by Louis and Mary Masullo, and by Donald and Bebie H. Snyder were read and approved on the first reading. The tracts are needed by the borough for the extension and opening of Beaver street, as a post-war project.

The Special committee reported that delivery of a new lime dust collector is expected by the Warner Company on March 28, and that from one to two months will be required to install the collector.

Councilman Kevin Smith, on behalf of the Undine Fire Company, invited Councilmen to attend the annual St. Patrick's Day banquet of the company Friday, March 17. Council accepted with thanks.

At the next regular meeting of Council the budget and a proposed zoning ordinance will be discussed.
