**URGERS AMERICANS TO BECOME 'RUMOR WARDENS'**  
Every American should become a self-appointed "rumor warden," according to Simon Marsson, instructor in sociology at the Pennsylvania State College, who believes that the practice of traditional Yankee skepticism is the best way to combat rumors.  
"If Americans would remember to refute unfounded stories with the well known 'Oh, Yeah?' or 'Sez You?' rumor mongers wouldn't have a chance," said Marsson. One of the most patriotic attitudes for any American to adopt is that of the person from Missouri who has to be shown a thing to believe it," he added.  
Rumor, which Marsson classes as an intrinsic aspect of morale, is present all the time, but can be particularly dangerous in times of crisis. It has already caused much harm in

this war, he said, and will continue to cause more trouble until people become less gullible.  
Marsson has laid down three principles for rumor wardens: (1) never repeat a rumor—not even to deny it; (2) deflate the rumor if you know the facts, or ask the rumor monger where he got his facts; (3) never give a rumor the benefit of the doubt.  
The sociology professor warned that rumors are not always started by enemy agents but frequently by "unthinking, stupid, respectable citizens of the community." He cautioned people to think before they make a careless statement or prediction, pointing out that their off-handed comment may be the origin of a harmful story.
