Carpenter's Mate Smith has the distinction of being a member of the First Battalion of the Sea-Bees—the first unit of that now famous group to come into being. He enlisted in the service on November 24, 1941, a few days before Pearl Harbor, and while he was a student at the BHS. After a month at Newport, R. I., he was sent to a trade school at Gosport, R. I. Three months later he was assigned to active duty and went to the South Pacific.

Since then he has been engaged in building and repairing airports, building army camps, repairing all kinds of ships, building docks, and, in short, helping to do anything that has to be done.

After a twenty-day leave of absence he is scheduled to report to Camp Parks, California, for further assignment.
