

### State College Gunner Awarded The Distinguished Flying Cross

A veteran of thirty B-26 Marauder attacks against Luftwaffe bases, railroad yards and other Nazi installations in France, Belgium and Holland, Technical Sergeant Kermit Hurwitz, 22, son of Mrs. Edith Hurwitz, who lives at the Orlando apartments in State College, was recently awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for extraordinary achievement as a radio operator and gunner on these missions.

The citation accompanying the DFC read in part: "Sergeant Hurwitz displayed untiring energy and keen professional skill in handling his guns against the attacks of enemy planes. Sgt. Hurwitz' courage and praise-worthy coolness under fire played a vital part in the successful completion of these missions."

In addition to the DFC, Sgt. Hurwitz also wears the Air Medal with

four Oak Leaf Clusters.

"The most exciting raid that I've been on was the attack on the Schiphol airfield at Amsterdam," Sgt. Hurwitz recalls. "The intense flak that we encountered tossed our plane like a cork on a rough sea. Despite extensive battle damage to our aircraft and injuries to two crew members, the bombs were placed accurately on the target. It was one of many good shows I have witnessed."

Sgt. Hurwitz attended the State College High School and the Pennsylvania State College, from which he graduated with a B. S. degree in 1936. Prior to enlisting in the Air Corps at New Cumberland, June 8, 1942, he was employed as a supervisor by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. He studied radio operation at the army technical school at Madison, Wisconsin, and left for overseas duty late in 1942.

**TIMELY TIPS ON KITE FLYING**

1. Fly your kite in an open field, away from all traffic, tall trees, electric poles and power lines.
2. Avoid kites with metal ribs. Use strong cord—no wire or tinzel twine—and keep it dry. Wet string will conduct electricity—and metal can cause a "short," if your kite should land on wires.
3. Keep a steady pull on the string. If the wind slackens, head the kite down. Add more tail if the kite darts or dives.
4. If your kite should land on wires or a pole, climbing after it or trying to knock it down with sticks and stones is dangerous. The kite is sure to be irretrievable, and you may damage wires, cutting off the electricity from many homes.
