damaged and Lt. Shultz gave the order to abandon ship.
Because the bombardier was so badly wounded that he couldn't get out of the plane, Shultz and the pilot decided to try to fly it back to England. After a harrowing journey Shultz landed the plane in England and received a decoration for that achievement.
He participated in a number of subsequent missions, then was sent to a rest camp in England and is believed to have resumed combat duty only a short time before he failed to return from a flight.
Lt. Shultz was graduated from the

Lock Haven High School and for a time was employed as a linotype operator by the Times Publishing Company in Lock Haven before returning to the Centre Democrat.

county met 98 per cent of the quota, and in the fourth campaign the record was over 100 per cent. The same condition shows in many other counties, he said, indicating clearly that the War Finance committees are improving their work.
Another feature stressed by the speaker is that since 1941 when the first War Loan was held 593 of every \$100 invested since that time in War Bonds remains invested with the government. In other words, total redemption of bonds since 1941 has been only 27 of every \$100 originally invested. He added that total purchases of War Bonds to date is about

46 billion dollars.
The 5th War Loan drive is tentatively scheduled to open about May 27, it was announced. No quota estimates are available at this time.
A number of problems met by various county units in past drives were discussed and arrangements were made to overcome such matters in future drives.
