Q—What amounts of good corn silage can be fed to horses and pigs?
A—By starting with small amounts and taking extra care no moldy silage gets to them, you can build up to one-half bushel per feeding for a horse or pig or even a little more than that for a horse.
Q—What time of year should seeds be planted to raise tomatoes and pepper plants that will be set out the last of May?
A—Figure on six weeks from planting to setting out in the garden.
Q—Can sprouted potatoes be kept for seed?
A—Yes. They should be handled carefully to avoid bruising, stored at about 40 degrees Fahrenheit in a relatively moist place, and selected for quality in the first place. Sprouts should be kept broken off because they use up stored food.
Q—What is liquid fertilizer?
A—The term covers everything from manure soaked in water to the complex chemical formula used for growing plants in a tank. In general it is a good plan to mix some dry fertilizer with the soil before planting. Use about one pound to one gallon of ordinary complete fertilizer like 3-8-7, and one pint per plant at time of transplanting. Follow that with either the same solution or a little dry fertilizer as a side dressing when plants are well started or show a need for more food.
Q—What is the remedy for the sweating of water pipes?
A—Insulation. The pipes sweat as warm air in the room comes in contact with the cold pipe and deposits some of its moisture. You can get the round asbestos material for pipes of various sizes.
Q—How can I get rid of buckwheat flies in the house?
A—Fill the shades down and then spray along the window sills where they go to the light. Sweep up and burn those you knock down with fly spray, and you will soon get the better of them.
Q—Can a buried box be treated for keeping live bait?
A—Yes. Tack copper wire screen over the outside to prolong the life of the box. Cresote or roof paint would be the best preservative.
Q—When should fruit tree grafting be done?
A—Cut your cions now and store them in moist sand in a cool place to keep them dormant. Set the grafts just as buds start to swell. I will get you a bulletin on the subject.
Q—Can lime be used for all vegetables?
A—Most vegetables are rather indifferent as to whether lime is present or not. But do not use lime for potatoes.
Q—What are "clipped" oats?
A—If you examine oats as they come from the threshing machine you will find they have several loose husks around the kernel that come to a long, pointed tip. At the mills, machines clip off the tip of these husks and remove some of the outer husks so the grain emerges cleaner and more compact and weighs more per bushel. Oats processed this way are called "clipped oats."
Q—What spray will kill maggots in onions?
A—Use a 3 per cent oil bordeaux, same as for apple trees, and you can control onion maggots. I will send you a page of information.
Q—How much should an acre of buckwheat yield?
A—So much depends on so many things that the yield is mostly a gamble. Sowing one-half bushel per acre and with fair soil and weather you should get 15 bushels back. Let me get you a complete bulletin on growing buckwheat.
Q—Could I use oats from 1942 for seed this year?
A—Yes, if they are a good variety and germinate well. Test some between wet blotters and see what per cent germinates.
Q—When should heifers be vaccinated against Bangs disease?
A—Calves should be vaccinated between the ages of four to nine months so they will clear up and give a negative reaction to test by the time they are bred. However, it is better to vaccinate at any time at all, even on mature cows and especially in herds where reactors are present. Men with a clean herd do not vaccinate after nine months, as a rule, because they do not want positive reactors in a negative or clean herd.

War Casualties From County Are Mounting

In the two years and four months of World War II since Pearl Harbor, Centre county's share of the cost in men has been 37 dead and an unknown number wounded or missing in action, a survey yesterday revealed.

All of the reported fatalities are based on War Department messages received by relatives. In some instances the cause of death was given, while in others no cause was listed.

Of the 37 men who have lost their lives to date, 16 were "killed in action," 13 lost their lives in accidents of various kinds not associated directly with combat duty; the cause of the death of 7 others was not given; 2 died in Japanese prisoner of war camps; 1 died in an air raid in England, and 1 died as the result of illness in a camp in this country.

While no accurate figures showing the number of men missing in action are available, the total is not believed to be large. Neither have there been many reports of soldiers suffering major wounds.
