## LUCAS INFANT

Isaac Mervin Arney, 76, prominent Potter township farmer, died at 11:30 a. m. Monday, April 3, 1944, at his home near Centre Hall from complications following a stroke suffered last Thursday. Born in Potter township November 22, 1867, he was a son of John J. and Sarah Jane Sweetwood Arney. His wife, the former Etha Lingle, preceded him in death. One son, J. Bruce Arney, at home, is his only survivor. The deceased was a member of Old Fort Masonic Lodge of Centre Hall and the Williamsport Consistory. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at the Goodhart funeral home in Centre Hall, with Rev. W. K. Hosterman officiating. Interment was made in Centre Hall cemetery.

## MRS. SARAH FRANCES BITNER

Mrs. Sarah Frances Bitner, 86, World War I Gold Star Mother, died Saturday at 3:30 p. m. at the home of her daughter, Mrs. D. Russell Mader, Lock Haven, where she had resided for the past 23 years. Mrs. Bitner, widow of Alfred F. Bitner of Blanchard, was born in Beech Creek, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Nathan Johnson, and lived in Blanchard most of her life until she went to Lock Haven. Her death followed complications due to old age. She was a member of the Church of Christ of Blanchard and of the American Legion Auxiliary. A son, Pvt. Howard W. Bitner, was killed in the last war, and in his honor the Bitner-Bechler Legion Post of Beech Creek-Blanchard was named. Only last year Mrs. Bitner received a Silver Star, awarded belatedly, for his gallantry in action. Surviving in addition to Mrs. Mader are another daughter and a son, Mrs. Henry Clark, Beech Creek, and Clair Bitner, Cleveland; two sisters, Mrs. Harry Work, Akron, O., and Mrs. David R. Wilson, Pittsburgh; also 15 grandchildren and 28 great-grandchildren.

## LEE RALPH SMITH

Lee Ralph Smith died at his home in Altoona at 11 o'clock Sunday morning after an extended illness. He was born in Milesburg, Centre county, July 31, 1885, the son of Alfred and Anna (Ginger) Smith. He was a P. R. R. police officer on the Middle division. Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Ella (Teace) Smith; one daughter, Mrs. Gladys Smith, at home; four sons: Cecil, Franklin, Eugene, all of Altoona; Mahlon, U. S. Army; three brothers, Claude, Lamar, Alvin, Columbus, Ohio, and Frank, Nanty-Glo. He was of the United Brethren faith. Mr. Smith served with the U. S. army on the Mexican border during the last war.

## EDWIN G. LEYDEN

Edwin G. Leyden, 80, died suddenly Sunday afternoon in his apartment in the Broadway House, Jersey Shore. He was born in Bellefonte, the son of Daniel Leyden and Louise Alexander Leyden, the family moving to Beech Creek about 1880. He was graduated from the Lock Haven State Normal School and taught for a short time in the Beech Creek borough schools, resigning in 1888 to enter the employ of the Beech Creek Railroad Company, later the New York Central Railroad Company, in the weigh scales in Beech Creek. When the railroad yards were developed there in 1910, he transferred and resided in Jersey Shore. About ten years ago he retired after working for that company 46 years. He was a member of Lafayette Lodge, No. 199, F. & A. M., for 34 years, also a member of Lafayette Chapter, Royal Arch Masons, and Hospitalier Commandery, No. 46, Knights Templar, all of Lock Haven. Two brothers, Capt. James Leyden, U. S. A., and Harry A. Leyden, preceded him in death, leaving as his only immediate survivor a sister, Mrs. Catharine Elliott, widow of William E. Elliott, founder of the Elliott Company of Woodland Road, Pittsburgh. Funeral services were held in Milesburg on Tuesday at 2 p. m., with interment in the family plot in the Bellefonte cemetery.

Mrs. Helen M. McNichol, 50, wife of Theodore J. McNichol, Altoona, died suddenly Thursday morning, March 30. She suffered a heart attack at home at 5 o'clock and was admitted at 5:30 o'clock to Mercy hospital. Mrs. McNichol was born in Milesburg on June 29, 1894, a daughter of James and Gertrude (McKinley) Gray, and had resided in Altoona for the past eleven years. 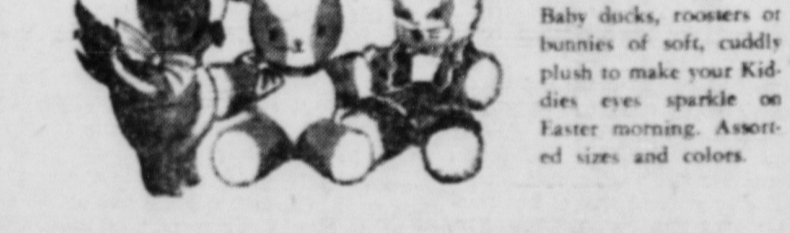
