—The town plot was laid out by Capt. James Harris, formerly of the Revolutionary armies, and a distinguished Deputy-Surveyor of the new Commonwealth, in the Spring of 1795. His own home, (now the large stone building owned by J. C. Hamilton), was put in living condition during that year and visited by the distinguished French statesman, Prince Talleyrand.

In 1796, or 1795 years ago, our "Spring" was first discovered and marked on the maps of the surveyors under Charles Lukens. In 1784, or 1800 years ago, the first house within the present town limits was erected by William Lamb (now owned by the Arthur Thomas estate), and in 1794, 150 years ago, John Dunlop arrived at what was to be the town's site.

These three iron plants were the cause of the great difference between the class of inhabitants who came to Bellefonte and those who formed the other growing towns of central Pennsylvania. Roland Curtin, Col. James Dunlop, David Irvine, William Lamb, John G. Lowrey, Benjamin Patton, William Petrikin, Robert T. Stewart, in addition to John Dunlop and James Harris, were all men of education, a certain amount of culture, and of undoubted ability, who came to this section not primarily to farm but to transact businesses of varied nature.

These last named persons were the principal inhabitants of Bellefonte prior to the erection of Centre county in 1800. In the 15 years succeeding the formation of the county so many men of outstanding ability came to make their homes in the little town that it immediately took an important place in central Pennsylvania, and became well known throughout the entire settled portion of the Commonwealth.

ser, with whom he resided along Penn's Creek east of Spring Mills, early that day and had walked to the Spring Mills Hotel where he tarried with friends during the afternoon. He made arrangements to spend the night with Clarence Breon, the plan being for him to accompany Mr. Breon to a public sale the following day.

At the hotel Mr. Ripka met a friend, Merrill Miller, who invited him to his home for supper, and after supper the two returned to the hotel. Mr. Miller said he left at 10 p. m., and that Mr. Ripka remained with other friends at the hotel.

Ripka is believed to have left the hotel a short time later, apparently to go to the Breon home for the night. It is believed that he either fell in the stream while crossing the highway bridge near the hotel, or fell while walking along the bank to reach a footbridge to cross to the Breon home.

On the day of his disappearance and for some days afterwards, Penn's Creek was high and muddy, and while it is believed possible that his body was carried immediately to

Inductee Hangs Self

Despondency over being ordered to report into the armed forces Tuesday, was blamed by Clearfield county coroner Erhard as the cause of Albert A. Adomines, 31-year-old Munson resident, for taking his own life. The victim, a single man, was found hanging in the barn at his home where he lived with his mother, Mrs. Mary Adomines.

Residents of the area expressed some doubt that the body could have been for several weeks in the position where it was discovered without someone discovering it earlier. Monday of last week Centre County Register Harry A. Corman and Roy Heckman, who live nearby, had faked leaves and debris from the lawn bordering the stream and had thrown such refuse in the creek at the point where Mr. Ripka's body later was discovered, without noticing the figure in the water.

Deceased was a son of John Z. and Mary Ann Ripka and was born in Decker Valley, Potter township, on September 7, 1871. Surviving brothers and sisters are: Charles J. Jared B. and Mrs. William Musser, all of Spring Mills; Lloyd E. of Pine Grove Mills, and Miss H. Irene Ripka, of near Milroy. Mr. Ripka was never married.

Funeral services were held in God's Missionary church at Zerby on Sunday afternoon with Rev. Truman Wise of Spring Mills officiating. Interment was made in the Mountain cemetery near Zerby.
