Noted Lecturer to be Heard at B. H. S. Auditorium

Through the efforts of the Bellefonte Kiwanis Club, Frederic Snyder, noted lecturer and publicist, is scheduled to make three appearances in Bellefonte on Tuesday, May 16. He will speak at State College on Monday, the 15th.

Mr. Snyder's first appearance in Bellefonte will be at noon when he will address the regular luncheon of the Kiwanis Club. In the afternoon he will be present for an assembly at the Bellefonte High School, and at 8 o'clock that night he will be heard at the Bellefonte High School auditorium. The evening performance is open to the public and tickets are now on sale at 50 cents each.

A fifth bill which was scheduled to have been submitted to the jury was disposed of when the defendant, Orrie Hanley, of Monaca, waived the findings of the Grand Jury and entered a plea of guilty to a charge of P. & B. He received the usual sentence providing for the care of the infant.
