(Continued from page one) by what periods. Many farmers are reorganizing their work to utilize more youngsters this year. For example, a farmer who always used a hired man to run his tractor, gets a high school boy or girl who cannot run it. So the farmer takes over the tractor himself and turns over some other chores to the youngster.

Some potato growers thought at first high school boys and girls could not be used to lift pushed crates, but that was solved by simply giving the smaller boys and girls smaller containers and having the huskier hands handle the heavy crates.

But the most efficient results of last year's farm labor shortage were accomplished largely through the exchange of labor, machinery, and equipment and by pooling these resources.
