Henry H. Geist, 55, a member of the department of chemistry at Penn State College since 1919, died in the Lebanon Hospital at 4 a. m. Friday, May 12, 1944. A native of Girardsville, Professor Geist was born on March 5, 1889. He obtained his bachelor's degree from the College in 1911 and his master's degree at the College in 1921. In addition, he had done graduate work at the University of Munich, Germany. He was employed as a chemist by the Philadelphia Reading Coal and Iron Company from 1912 to 1917, and by the Wright-Martin Aircraft Corporation from 1917 to 1919, when he went to the College as an instructor. Professor Geist, whose title was associate professor of quantitative analysis, specialized in gas analysis and precipitation of metal of organic bases. He was well known for his work as faculty adviser to Alpha Chi Sigma, social fraternity, and will be remembered for philanthropic deeds among students. He was a member of Sigma Xi, graduate scientific honorary fraternity; Phi Lambda Upsilon, national chemistry honorary society; of the American Chemical Society; and of the Masons. He also served as faculty adviser to Inter-Fraternity Council. Professor Geist is survived by a sister, Mrs. F. J. Auch, of Elizabethtown; and two brothers, Warren Geist, of Mount Carmel, and Frank J. Geist, of Buffalo, N. Y. Funeral services were held from the home of his brother, Warren, in Mt. Carmel, Monday afternoon.

W. D. WALKER
W. D. Walker died in the Clearfield Hospital on Sunday, April 16, 1944. The son of the late Irvin and Amanda Walker, the deceased was born at Yarnell, Centre county, on January 18, 1879, making his age at time of his death, 65 years, 2 months and 28 days. Mr. Walker was married in the year 1900 to Rachel Woomer of Pleasant Valley, Centre county, who with the following six children survive: Harold, of Buffalo, N. and Chester A. of Bigler. One sister, Mrs. H. O. Miller, who preceded him in death. The deceased was an active business man from early in life. The firm W. D. Walker & Bro. (C. A. Walker) having interests in lumber, coal, and general merchandise, was formed when the brothers were aged 20 and 18 years respectively, and continued until the death of the older brother. The first business interest was lumbering for a little more than a year near State College. Then in the same interest he came to West Virginia, where they which they located in Bigler. Here for thirty-three years Mr. Walker conducted his varied business interests with integrity. He served for six years as school director of Bradford township, and ten years as a director of the County National Bank. Early in life Mr. Walker became a member of the United Brethren church at Yarnell where he served as superintendent of the Sunday School. Upon moving to Bigler he transferred his membership to the Bigler U. B. class. The Bigler Quarterly Conference soon honored him by electing him to both the church and parsonage boards of trustees. In these capacities he had the opportunity to serve, using his business abilities and manifesting his generosity in the construction of the new brick church and parsonage. Funeral services were held from the Bigler United Brethren church on Thursday afternoon, April 20, with his pastor, Rev. G. O. Neff, officiating. Interment was made in the Bigler cemetery.

Launder (verb); laundry (noun).
