New Tax Law: According to a new tax law which has recently been passed an additional percentage of one-half per cent per month will be added to all unpaid school taxes. This means that instead of the usual 5% penalty being added to school taxes which are unpaid at the present time, there is up to May 1st, 7%, and an additional one-half per cent each month added until same is paid. It will be profitable for all persons to see that their school tax is paid in time, for the longer it runs unpaid the larger the bill will be. This includes, not only on property tax, but per-capita tax as well.

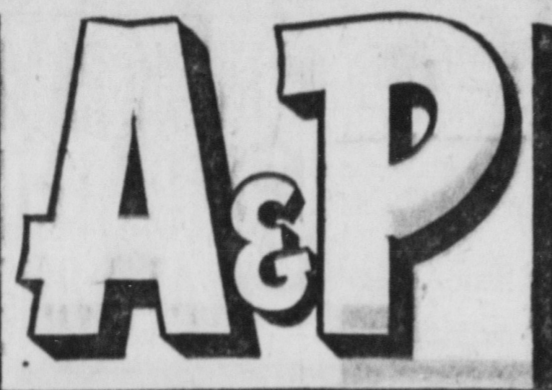
